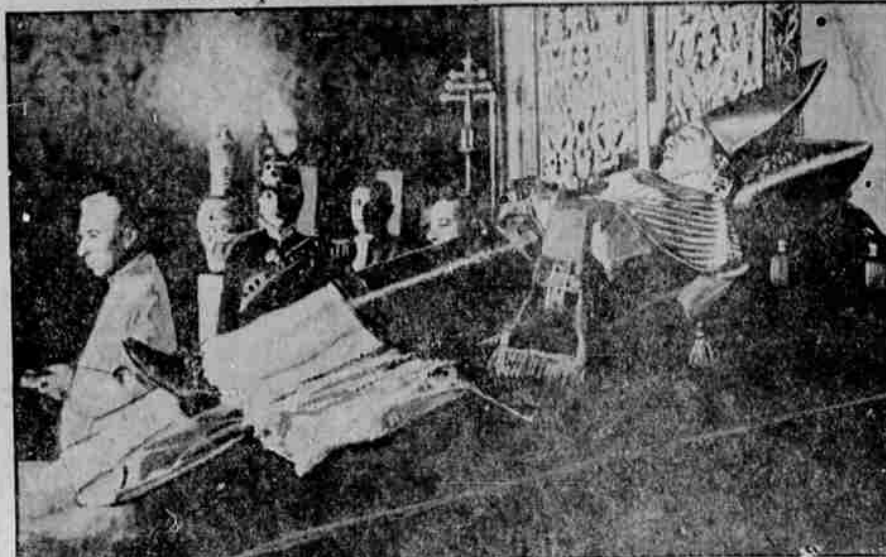

WIRELESS AIDS MEXICAN PEACE

 MEXICO CITY, Feb. 10.—Wireless telegraphy has contributed greatly to keeping down revolution in Mexico and the government, recognizing its value, is establishing stations in every large city in the republic.

Officials assert that by using the wireless they are able to communicate readily and immediately with military headquarters and thus are able to head off many incipient uprisings which might grow into serious revolutions if not promptly checked.

In the old days the first thing a band of rebels did was to cut all telegraph and telephone wires, thus isolating the region of revolt.

In its station at Chapultepec Park here the Mexican government has one of the largest and best equipped plants on the continent. During the Carranza administration the station was practically idle but during the past few months it has been used daily by the government in sending official news letters to Central and South American countries and in keeping its ministers and consuls informed of affairs at home.

It has been announced that the government expects to open the station shortly for commercial work.

It has also been found that the station here can be used as a supplement for the land wires throughout the republic and congestion on the latter is often relieved by the Chapultepec plant.

Ignacia Galindo, who for many years has been identified with wireless activity in Mexico, will represent the republic at the radio-telegraph convention to be held in Rome next April.

WAS IN ACTION SHORT TIME

 ANN ARBOR, Mich., Feb. 10.—Although in action only about 12 hours of the 1921 season, Ernest Vick of Toledo, star center of the University of Michigan eleven, won the coveted honor of being selected as All-American center by Walter Camp, Coach Fielding H. Yost regards Vick's achievement as one of the most remarkable in the history of American football.

Vick is a student in the medical school and did not complete his school work until about five o'clock in the afternoon. Coach Yost's automobile took him to Ferry Field every day as soon as he had completed his studies but he always arrived just as the remainder of the squad was leaving the field. With the exception of five hours spent in practice on Saturday, Vick was not in uniform at any time except during the seven games played by Michigan this year.

Arriving at Ferry Field, Vick would run several times around the cinder track and then submit to a vigorous rub-down. This constituted his only exercise during the playing season except for that obtained in games.

On a few evenings a week Vick met with Coach Yost and other mentors to receive "skull" practice. New plays were explained to him and he was kept up to date on the team's development.

"Vick always is in superb physical condition at each season of the year and this accounts for his ability to make the All-American without practice," Coach Yost explained. "He had received three years of university football training previously, being benefitted by the S. A. T. club, and he knew the game from start to finish."

Vick played three positions on defensive and at various times during the last season, center, loose end and left tackle. In his four years of varsity play it is said that he failed to make a single bad pass. Another distinction he holds is that at no time during the four years was time taken out for him during a game.

MOUNT REDOUT STEAMS

 ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Feb. 10.—Clouds of steam have been reported rising from Mount Redoubt, 50 miles south of here on Cook Inlet, by L. C. Grove, wireless operator at Kenai. Mount Hlamna, in the same district, has been emitting smoke to a greater or less degree for several years, but this is said to be the first time Redoubt has shown signs of activity for 18 years. Great columns of steam have been reported rising high in the air from the crater, and the natives along the inlet are reported apprehensive.

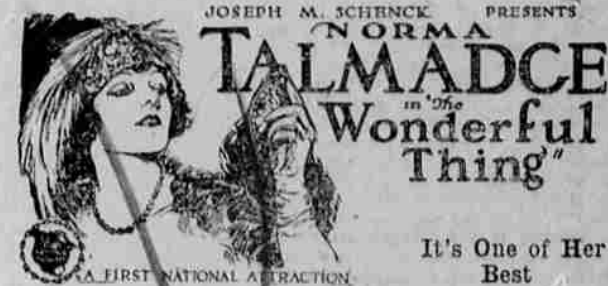

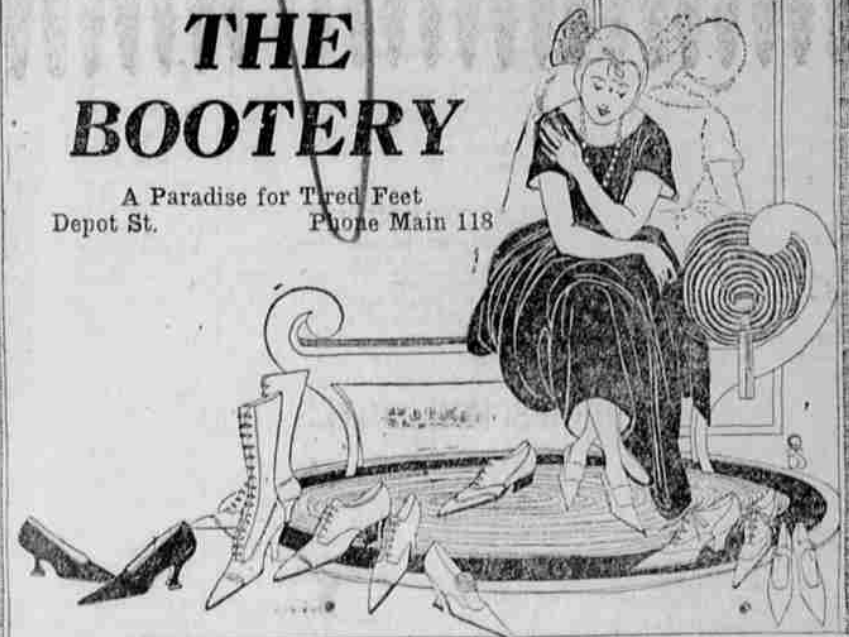
