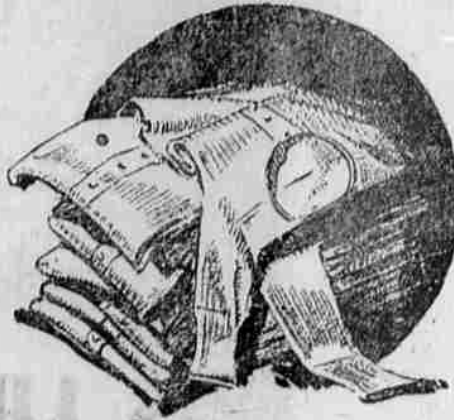

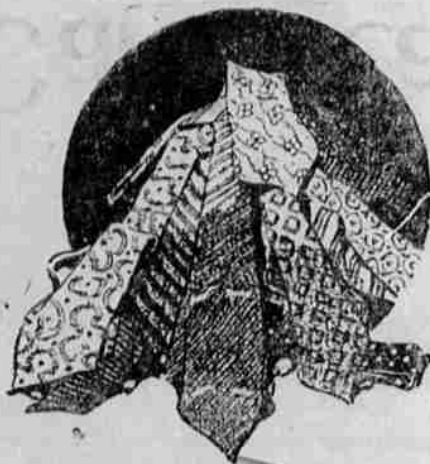

INEBRIATES DECREASING

Fewer Young Men Among Those Needing Reclamation from Drinking Habit.

CHICAGO, Feb. 10.—Today's inebriates are mostly men of older years, the percentage of young men falling sharply from what it used to be, according to Judge J. Kent Greene, president of the Washington Home Association, the oldest operating institution in the United States for the reclamation of drink addicts.

Founded in 1863, the association for many years was run as a semi-municipal institution, receiving city payments which in 1883 were limited to \$20,000 a year by legislative enactment. Two years ago it sold the building it maintained for men for \$135,000 and concentrated its greatly reduced activities in its women's home.

"In 1921 five men under 30 years of age were admitted to the home," Judge Greene, who is manager of the Commerce Court of the Chicago Association of Commerce, said in his annual report. "Between the ages of 30 and 40, 30 were admitted; between 40 and 50 years, 65; between 50 and 60 years, 65; between 60 and 70 years, nine, and one over 70."

"All available evidence is that most of our dealings hereafter will be with patients of older years. We may wait until those of the older living generation have passed away before a very marked effect on the habits of the people as to temperance is noticed, but the opinions of the younger generation will be enforced more strongly every year."

"As the deadly effects of moonshine intoxicants are becoming more and more appreciated, and if there is a more rigid enforcement of the law, we can shortly count on a rapid decline in our present patronage, and our beloved institution will be obliged very shortly to look to other fields of work."

INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE

NOGALES, Ariz., Feb. 10.—The chambers of commerce of Nogales, Arizona, and Nogales, Sonora, across the Mexican border from this city, have sent invitations to chambers of commerce throughout Mexico and the United States, to trade associations, manufacturing corporations, bankers and representatives of both governments to attend the annual convention of the Confederated Chambers of Commerce of Mexico, to be held in Nogales, Sonora, April 1, 2, 3, and 4.

The Confederated Chambers of Commerce of Mexico is similar in its scope to the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. Growth of the chamber of commerce idea in Mexico is regarded as one of the principal factors in bringing Mexico back to a settled condition, and the aid and cooperation of commercial organizations in the United States is sought.

At the conclusion of the convention all delegates and visitors will be taken on a special train for a 1,000-mile trip through the west coast states of Sonora, Sinaloa and Nayarit, the southernmost point to be visited being the quaint city of Tepic.

On the fourth day of the convention there will be an international business conference in Nogales, Arizona, for exchange of ideas for better understanding of the Mexican market and exporting to Mexico.

Offered Job as Coach.

Van Gent is now in the athletic department at Leland Stanford university. After his graduation from Wisconsin, he was freshman football and basketball coach at the local university, afterwards becoming football coach at the University of Texas.

NOTRE DAME WANTS TO WIN

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Feb. 10.—Around a five star combination of athletes Coach Knute Rockne is building a track team that he believes will bring high honors to the University of Notre Dame this year.

Rockne has these five men as a nucleus for his team: August Desch, world's low hurdle champion; Johnny Murphy and William Hayes, former national champions in the high jump and hundred yard dash, respectively; "Buck" Shaw, conference title holder in the shot put, and Chet Wynne, a hurdler of national renown.

In addition to this quintet, he has several men who performed well in meets last year. Among them are Edward Hogan, who has a pole vault record of 11 feet, 9 inches; Eugene Oberst, who has thrown the javelin 170 feet, and John Montague, with a record of 51 for the quarter mile.

Balance of Trade Has Been Reversed

MANILA, P. I., Feb. 10.—For the first time in many months the balance of trade of the Philippine Islands during November was in the favor of the islands. The total trade for the month amounted to

\$13,176,000 of which \$8,932,311 was for exports and \$4,243,689 for imports.

According to the bureau of customs the excess of exports over imports is due both to the fact that the Philippines have bought less than usual and to a better market for copra, sugar and hemp, some of the leading products of the country.

NORMALCY IS WITHIN SIGHT

CLEVELAND, O., Feb. 10.—Economic students here declare the automobile industry is leading the country back to normalcy. They cite as evidence, advance 1921 registration statistics.

One person out of every ten in the United States owns a motor vehicle—for a grand total of 10,502,000 passenger cars and trucks. This represents the registration of the various states as of December 31st, 1921, and is an increase of 1,206,748 cars and trucks over 1920 when 9,295,252 cars and trucks were recorded, according to information sent in to a prominent motor car company here.

In some states the gain was as much as 35 per cent and ten states reported an increase of more than 20 per cent. The national gain was 15 per cent. In the race between Ohio and New York state for first position the latter won again with 755,000 as against Ohio's 744,000. Next in order came Pennsylvania, California, Illinois, Michigan, Texas, Iowa and Indiana. Combined the first nine states own over half the cars of the country, according to these statistics.

TO STOCK WITH PARTRIDGES.

SPOKANE, Wash., Feb. 10.—Eastern Montana sportsmen, anxious to introduce Hungarian partridges into the Bitter Root and Flathead valleys, will at last be able to secure birds, following action of members of the Spokane County Sportsmen's association, who voted to ship 24 pairs of birds to the Montana game commission.

The birds were given to Spokane county by the Washington state game department. It is understood that the Montana commission, in return, will give Spokane county an equal amount, in value, of trout or prairie chicken.

SENATE INDORSES ENVOYS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—President Harding's nominations of ambassadors to the former central powers today received the indorsement of the senate foreign relations committee.

The nominations of Allison B. Houghton of New York, to be ambassador to Germany; Albert H. Washburn of Massachusetts, to be minister to Austria, and Theodore Brentano of Illinois, to be minister to Hungary, were reported favorably to the senate with confirmation declared assured.
