## ATHLETICS ARE UNDERMINED

### Professionalism in College Sports a Serious Menace to Their Future.

(By Associated Press.)  
MADISON, Wis., Feb. 16.—The professional spirit growing within as well as without colleges "in commercializing competitive football, basketball and baseball is doing much to undermine athletics and unless stopped is bound to cause serious damage to college sport." Coach T. E. Jones, director of athletics at the University of Wisconsin, said recently in a statement.

"Between amateur and professional athletics there is a gulf that cannot be spanned," the coach said. "The ideals and ends of the two are as far apart as the poles. The athlete who chooses one must give up the other."

"If professionalism were to creep into college athletics it would rob the game of its educational value and its ideals, leaving no good reason for the continued existence of these sports."

"Chief among the influences working to the detriment of intercollegiate activities are those small colleges which do not belong to any organized conference, who have no freshman rule, who are free lances and play from one end of the country to the other without regard for time or schedules. Standard schools who schedule these colleges are doing much to damage athletics."

"Some newspapers have done considerable damage in trying to mould public opinion toward more freedom in amateur sport through permitting summer baseball. Some of these papers, probably unintentionally, have caused harm by giving more space and prominence to professional sport events than to amateur college athletics."

"There is also the evil of extending football schedules past their season where the commercialized idea is of course prominent. All of these things tend to damage college sport in the eyes of the public."

"To maintain a wholesome interest in sport it must be played according to the established rules, and every part in its season. I believe the western conference is one of the cleanest organizations in the country in this respect."

## TRAPSHOOTING CONTEST SOON

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Feb. 16.—High guns of the trapshooting fraternity, several fresh from competition in southern fields, are expected on the grounds when the first target is released in the eighteenth annual Interstate Trapshooting Tournament here soon.

The big event of the tournament is the international championship, but, according to experts here, the contests for the interstate flyer cup and the interstate target cup promise keen competition for interest.

The international championship race is confined to twenty-eight shooters and the entry list, as announced, includes the names of Frank Troeh, Vancouver, Washington; Martin McAvoy, New York; R. A. King, St. Louis; B. F. Elbert, Des Moines, Ia.; J. P. Bear, Omaha; Frank Hughes, Mobridge, South Dakota; M. R. Orr, Piqua, Ohio; E. C. Wheeler, Pawhuska, Oklahoma; W. H. McCreary, La Junta, Colorado; Fred Etchen, Coffeyville, Kansas; Riley Thompson, Cainesville, Missouri; Harve Dixon, Orange, Missouri; F. J. Cairns, Tampa, Kansas; and D. K. Dickinson, Merriam, Kansas.

Fred Etchen is holder of the Interstate Flyer Cup. The Kansas champion will defend it against a large field of shooters. Keen competition also is expected to await Troeh, holder of the Interstate Target Cup. Both shooters participated in the Sunny South Handicap at Houston, Texas, late in January, as did Hughes, Wheeler and several of the other entrants.

One of the feature events of the tournament, according to officials, will be the contest between all-Missouri and all-Kansas squads. Arrangements also are being made for a match between all-Iowa and all-Pennsylvania teams.

## WORLD'S FIRST BOWLING MEET

CHICAGO, Feb. 16.—Twenty-four picked bowlers, the nation's best, according to a compilation of bureau and match averages, will compete in the first annual world's classic tournament here February 9 to 25. The contestants have been selected from a large field, which was narrowed to fifty and later to twenty-four.

In the past, the winner of the all-events in the American Bowling Congress tournament has been considered the leader in the bowling world. There is a certain element of luck in rolling a few games and a man may roll below or above his normal average. This condition of 115 games, however, which will last for sixteen consecutive days, is believed by the tournament committee to be a test which will determine the actual bowling champion.
