adopted to the result of more profitable crop production in Union county. With many farmers producing wheat at a considerable loss last year, practices which will reduce expenses or increase yields will be of great assistance. A part of the farm crops program will be presented at Union on Tuesday and Wednesday at La Grande, the entire day will be given over to field crops discussions.

Case Required
 Fruit growers in session at Imbler recently expressed themselves as believing "that the year 1922 required careful management if a profit is to be made." With this in view a series of schools will be held in Union county this year. The farms of Ray Wilson at Imbler and Stackland Bros. at Cove have been selected as headquarters for these demonstrations, which are for all interested, and will cover the entire range of horticultural practice. The first of this series of demonstrations will begin with a general trouble school and pruning demonstration. This program will be presented at Cove on Tuesday and Imbler on Wednesday.

One Day At Union
 Livestock day is to be held this year at Union. With a heavy loss over a period of years, livestock men are encouraged by recent developments in the demand for all classes of meat animals. The livestock program to be presented on Tuesday, February 21, will include among the speakers Robert Withycombe in charge of the Union Experiment Station; H. A. association went to Washington to confer with the department of justice and the department of commerce on the activities of the organization with special reference to making the association's work conform in all the many technical details to the federal interpretation of the laws. "This work has been entirely ignored by the trade commission in its report," Mr. Stoddard declared.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 16.—Charges by the federal trade commission that there had been "active co-operation" between the Western Pine Manufacturers' association and the West Coast Lumbermen's association "with the purpose and effect of harmonious action on prices and production" were denied today in a statement made public by Robert B. Allen, manager of the West Coast Lumbermen's association.

"The relationship between the two associations has been so strained," Mr. Allen said, "that we have never been able to agree on much of anything. We have never attempted to agree on prices. Right now we are fighting each other on tariff, carload minimum and freight adjustments."

"We even differ in regard to the federal trade commission itself. My understanding is that the Western Pine Manufacturers' association subscribes to the growing sentiment that the commission should be abolished."
