

DIES AFTER AN OPERATION

JOSHUA, Feb. 14.—Charles C. Cummings died Saturday morning following an operation removing his tonsils. Mr. Cummings was born in Prescott, Wash., Oct. 21, 1891, but has lived in Joseph the last 11 years. He is survived by two brothers and two sisters. One sister, Mrs. Maud Hall of Lewiston, Idaho, was the only one present at the funeral. Services were held in the Nazarine church Wednesday afternoon and the remains interred in the Prairie Creek cemetery.

Poultry production, at present the most profitable line of farming in this section, will have an entire day Thursday, February 23, at La Grande. C. S. Brewster, formerly of the poultry department of the Oregon Agricultural college, now with Kerr Gifford & Company will be the principal speaker. Subjects to be presented include breeding, hatching and rearing and feeding for egg production. Two well known local poultry men, Dr. W. T. Pay of Hot Lake and L. M. Jensen of La Grande have been invited to address the convention on the methods they have successfully used in the valley.

Robent control work will be presented the fore part of the week at Kato, Union and La Grande. Mrs. N. Gabrielson of the Bureau of Biological Survey will explain methods of controlling ground squirrels and gophers as used by the Biological survey and outline plans for community organization for robust extermination.
