Columbia Gorge Hotel Is Ordered Closed By Benson

HOOD RIVER, Feb. 17.—Henry Thiele has received orders from Simon Benson, who is wintering in California, to close the Columbia Gorge hotel. Inquiries here disclose that the message from Benson provides for the closing of the hotel indefinitely. The order, according to Thiele, goes into effect April 1.

While no definite reason is assigned for Benson's action, it is known here that lack of support has had a depressing effect on the hotel owner. It is also said the hotel was not given the publicity it deserved in arrangements for big Eastern lecture tours.

Hood River has supported the hotel in every way possible this winter, but this income, it is said, did not meet expenses, losses having amounted to about \$4000 per month since October. Thiele is making plans to move his family to Portland.

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MANY CHILDREN ARE INSPECTED

County Health Nurse Makes Report for Two Months Showing Much Activity.

The report of Miss Louise Zorn, county health nurse, for the months of December, 1921, and January, 1922, shows that she weighed and measured 1089 pupils during those two months in the schools of the county. Of these 488 were found underweight and 71 overweight.

Miss Zorn gave 57 classroom talks in schools she visited during those two months. She also held four public health community meetings.

A total of 1570 pupils were inspected aside from the weighing and measuring. Of these 569 were found from defects. The defects of the others were in the main of a mild nature, with several exceptions.

According to her report, in some of the districts of the county as a result of the weighing and measuring of

pupils, the school boards are considering supplying a glass of milk but in the middle of the forenoon and in the afternoon for those children needing it. "Some children need food often than at meal-times," Miss Zorn's report says. "This will enable them to do better school work and possibly make a grade they could not without the extra nourishment. This would be more economical than keeping the child in school another year."

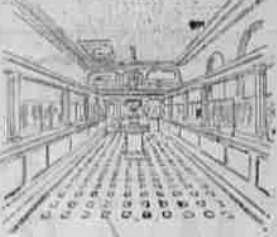
