PENDLETON GIRLS WIN

Local High Team Is Defeated by Score of 31 to 23 Last Night.

The Pendleton high school girls' basketball team practically clinched the Eastern Oregon championship last night by defeating the strong local sextette by a score of 31 to 23.

The game started off with a rush and La Grande took an early lead. For the remainder of the half the teams saw-sawed, first one leading then the other. The half ended in favor of the local girls, 13 to 12. In the latter half the two Pendleton forwards got going and from then on La Grande was unable to overcome the lead. The blue and white staged a last minute rally that netted a few points but failed to win the game.

The game was featured by the splendid work of the two diminutive Pendleton forwards and by the close guarding of the whole Pendleton team. Marjorie O'Brien, La Grande forward, was the outstanding star for the locals and also high point scorer.

A return game will be played at Pendleton in a short time and La Grande's only chance to get back into the race is to win then, which would be La Grande and Pendleton for the honors, thus necessitating a play-off. A large crowd was in attendance and the student body exhibited a tremendous amount of pep. This evening the boys team will play the hitherto undefeated Enterprise team, the game commencing at 8 o'clock in the high school gym.
