REPUBLICS ARE CONSOLIDATED

TIFLIS, Georgia, Feb. 27.—The commercial consolidation of the four Soviet republics of the Caucasus—Armenia, Azerbaijan, Georgia and Little Mountain republic—has been effected, with this city as the controlling capital.

The respective presidents of the four republics will remain, but the consolidation is expected to reduce to a minimum the old boundary and customs disputes.

The new economic policy, launched by Moscow last fall, whereby commerce is free, has resulted in the opening of many stores, the increase of business, and the general improvement of living conditions. Food and clothes, while scarce, are much cheaper than in Moscow.

The railroads, under the single control of Mironov, are operating and a direct train service to Moscow in five days has been established.

Business with Persia is reviving, and freight is again being shipped from Persia to Constantinople. The steamer services between Baku and Enzeli, on the Caspian Sea, have been restored, as well as caravan routes.

PENDLETON IS WINNER AGAIN

Both Boys and Girls from This City Lose at Basketball During Week-end.

The Pendleton high school five made it four straight by winning from La Grande Saturday night 47 to 12, in the final game of the two-game series. The score at the end of the first half was 13 to 2 in favor of the Pendleton boys and in the first five minutes of the second half they ran up 20 points before La Grande could score.

The local girls fared little better, being defeated 40 to 39 in a much closer game. Pendleton was in no danger at any time during the game. This game gives the Round-Up City girls the interscholastic basketball championship of Eastern Oregon for this season.

Both games were splendid exhibitions of basketball and neither game brought out any exceptional plays, practically all of the scoring resulting from teamwork.

The Pendleton line-up was: Holmgren and Nelson, forwards; Captain Lawrence, center; F. Cramer and Cahill, guards. La Grande played: Smith and Captain Lynch as forwards; Metcalf, center, and Collier and Bean, guards. There were no substitutions.

The La Grande girls' team line-up was: Marjorie O'Brien and Norma Mayger, forwards; Winona Lyman and Thelma Choate, centers; Lula Mulkey and Marie Bowman, guards. Lon Lyman took Thelma Choate's place and Audrey Hare went in for Winona Lyman.

The girls' game was refereed by King of Pendleton, a W. S. C. graduate, and the boys' game was refereed by Penton, of Helix.

ESKIMOS ARE DYING RAPIDLY

COPENHAGEN, Feb. 27.—The Eskimos of Labrador appear to be dying, or at least a deteriorating race, says Harold Lindow, Vice-Governor of Northern Greenland, who has just returned from a visit to the Eskimo settlements on the Eastern coast of Labrador.

Mr. Lindow said the Eskimo of Labrador did not compare well with the Greenland Eskimo and that they were in great need of protection. He asserted that they were being exploited by unscrupulous traders and driven farther north year after year.

The missionaries were the only ones who gave the Eskimos any real help. Medical assistance, Mr. Lindow said, is difficult to obtain in Labrador and the Eskimo women suffer greatly from the lack of medical attention.

NIGHTSHIRT CLAN IS TOPIC

Men's Club of M. E. Church Will Discuss Ku Klux Klan from Several Angles.

The Ku Klux Klan will be the topic of discussion Tuesday evening at the regular meeting of the Men's Club of the Methodist church. The much-mooted topic will be handled from two angles, namely: the post-Civil War Ku Klux, and the present-day manifestations of it, particularly what it is doing in Oregon at the present time. In the light of the fact that Ku Klux organizers are reported to have spent several days in La Grande last week, the topic is pre-eminently timely.

LOCAL BOYS ARE GIVEN HONORS

Island City Pig Club Members Among Leaders in Industrial Club Work in State.

County Agent Avery has received the achievement pins awarded to the personnel of the Island City Pig Club and is presenting them to the nine boys who are members of the club. The club has the record of being one hundred per cent in their work for the past year, every member of the club having finished his required work.

The Island City Pig Club has quite an enviable record for the past year. In addition to every member's winning the achievement pin, two members, Lester Blokland and Albert Bosquet, were taken to the State Fair by Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe for their standing in the boys' club work. The stock judging team, sent from this vicinity to the Pacific International Stock Show at Portland last fall, was composed of three members of the club, Lester Blokland, Albert Bosquet and Roy Bennett. That team placed fourth against teams competing from three states and second among the Oregon teams.

The program for the year's work is divided into three divisions, complete records being kept on each project. The divisions are: (1) raising and caring for a little pig, (2) raising and caring for one or more purebred pigs, and (3) raising and caring for one or more grade hogs to be fed for the market.

All divisions were represented last year and the boys are planning on raising some hogs to enter in the Pacific International Stock Show at Portland this fall to compete for the prizes offered to Eastern Oregon by the Union Stockyards Co. of Portland.

The officers and members of the club are as follows: Roy Bennett, president; Albert Bosquet, vice president; Lester Blokland, secretary and treasurer; the other members being Howard Bosquet, Joe Sayre, Marion Alkerman, Howard Smith, Donald and Edwin Patten. County Agent Avery has been in charge of the club during the last year but will endeavor to secure another leader for the ensuing year.

Mrs. Catlin Criticized.
The Observer has a communication criticizing the Red Cross for employing Mrs. Fay Catlin. The writer of that communication evidently has never been connected with public work for he advocates laying the city off in zones and appointing some person in each zone for a thirty or sixty day period to dish out the money for charity, and to look after the sick and afflicted. Does he realize that the Red Cross offices and headquarters attend to more than home charities? Does he realize that Mrs. Catlin's office has been attorney in fact for the service men obtaining for the men of Union county more than \$26,000 from the government in just and honorable claims, much of which would never have been received had not one like Mrs. Catlin taken up the case and fought it out along honorable and dignified lines with the government?

Does this letter writer further realize that in La Grande's Red Cross worker the community has one who not only sees the hungry but many times she heals the broken hearts of young people, of mothers and fathers by bringing together those who have been estranged; by breaking down a willful youngster's temper with human love, by rejuvenating a home which is slipping, by throwing the broad man-
