(By Associated Press) GALVESTON, Tex., Feb. 27.—Jente, arriving Wednesday from New York, brought the story of a The Morgan line steamer El Oren tragedy in which seven men lost their lives after enduring days of suffering. The men were the crew of the Pennacola schooner Caldwell H. Colt, which was wrecked on a Florida reef February 13 in a gale.

The El Oriente brought one of the two survivors, Capt. L. A. Smith, master of the schooner. The other survivor was picked by a British tanker and taken to New Orleans.

The nine men clung for several days without food or drink to the schooner's wave-swept deck, then one by one dropped off until four were left. One of these, Frank Brooks, was swept away on a booby hatch and he was the sur-

vivor later found by the British tanker.

Captain Smith, Joseph Mendenhall and Francis Nohrsted, floating on the deck of the wrecked schooner, were sighted Monday afternoon by the El Oriente. Before they could be rescued, Nohrsted fell from exhaustion and drowned. Mendenhall shortly after being rescued and was buried at sea at sundown last Monday.

UMATILLA TAX RATE HIGHER

PENDLETON, Feb. 27.—The tax rate in Umatilla county for 1929 will be at the rate of 16.6 mills, according to figures that have been secured by County Assessor R. O. Hawley, or an increase from 15.5 mills which prevailed last year. The increase is largely due to the lower valuation given the county by the state tax commission on public utilities. The valuation of property in the county has increased. The present valuation is \$88,247,757.97.
