CITY BUILDING IS RENOVATED

Many Changes Made for Convenience and Efficiency; Fire Department Used Spare Time for Work.

The fire department force, under the supervision of City Manager O. A. Kratz, have been giving the city building a thorough going over in the last few weeks. They have put in several improvements and also strengthened the building in many ways and have used only material that was already on hand, the work costing the city not a cent.

A new door has been cut between the city treasurer's office and the hallway, making the entire building, excepting the police station, accessible without going outside. This is a great convenience as in cold weather whenever a person left the city treasurer's office to go upstairs he would have to go outside, and, besides being inconvenient, there was danger of blowing papers or documents into the street.

The janitor's room on the upper floor has been made into two rooms and one of them utilized as a ladies' lavatory.

In the basement beams and other reinforcements have been erected underneath the sagging floors and settling walls and in places concrete has been used to strengthen the support.

A large room adjacent to the furnace has been excavated and will be used as a storage room for fuel. Coal can be purchased by the carload now, instead of by the ton, as was formerly the case. A chute has also been put in.

Another room, just behind the fire department engine room, has been converted into a repair shop and the repairing will be done there in the future, instead of outside.

EGYPT WILL SOLVE OWN PROBLEMS

December 29, 1921, following serious rioting in Cairo, Alexandria, Tanta and other places, in which scores were killed, many wounded and several hundred persons arrested.

The present disturbed conditions fol-

lowed the rejection, by an Egyptian delegation representing the Sultan of a proposed convention by the British government providing for a termination of the protectorate which has continued since 1914 and for new measures of native administration under British control.

Zagloul Pasha, one of the Nationalist leaders, was formerly Minister of Justice. Supported by strong Turkish and other elements, he has agitated complete independence for Egypt ever since the great war. After the war his influence was so pronounced and his secret organization so widespread that the British had difficulty in finding any Egyptian willing to accept high office in the government.

During the Paris peace conference, Zagloul and a few of his aides under-

took to present the case of Egypt but he and his fellow nationalists were arrested and imprisoned in Malta, where they remained until the conference adjourned. The Nationalists, meanwhile, carried on an extensive propaganda by violent outbreaks in Cairo and Alexandria. On October 14, 1921, Zagloul arrived at Cairo but the British forbade his landing and Viscount Allenby, several months later, ordered his deportation to Ceylon.

The permanent military occupation of Egypt by the British was followed in 1884 by the revolt of the Mahdists or religious fanatics, armed followers of a supposed Mohammedan messiah. General Charles George ("Chene") Gordon, who was sent by the British government to the Sudan to assist the khedive in withdrawing the garrisons of the country which could

hold out no longer against the Mahdi, was besieged for months at Khartoum and killed in the storming of the city on January 26, 1885. Subsequently, the revolt was put down, General Kitchener opened the road to Khartoum and Egyptian way in that region was established by the British army in 1898. In the work of developing Egypt along modern lines, Gladstone, "The Great Commoner" of England, had no small part.
