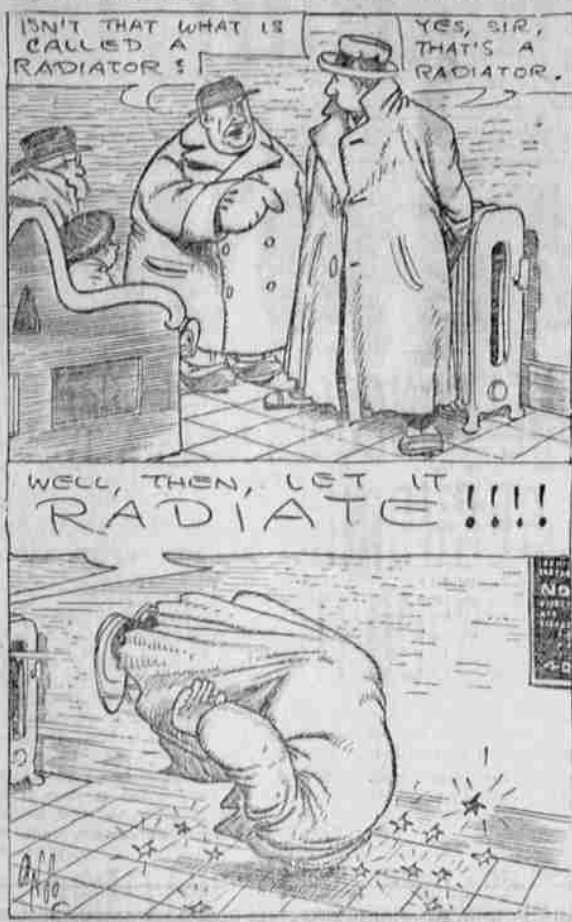

Income Tax Facts

When a return is made in good faith and an understatement of the amount of the tax therein is due to no fault of the taxpayer, no penalty attaches, but interest attaches to the amount of the deficiency at the rate of one-half of 1 per cent per month. If the understatement is due to negligence or to intentional disregard of authorized rules and regulations with knowledge thereof, but without intent to defraud, there is to be added 5 per cent of the total amount of the deficiency plus interest at the rate of 1 per cent a month from the time the tax was due. If the understatement is false with intent to evade the tax the penalty is a fine of not more than \$10,000 or one year's imprisonment, or both, together with the costs of prosecution, and 50 per cent of the total amount of the deficiency which is added by assessment to the tax.

If for any reason a return cannot be filed by the due date, application may be made to the collector of internal revenue of the district in which the taxpayer lives or has his principal place of business, setting forth the facts as to the taxpayer's inability to file on time. Upon showing a reasonable excuse, such as absence, illness, etc., the collector may grant an extension of time not to exceed 30 days in which to file the return. If further extension of time is required application must be made to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, the collector having authority to grant only an extension of not to exceed 30 days.

The commissioner may grant an extension on a reasonable cause shown, not exceeding six months. This six months' limitation, however, is not applicable to taxpayers who are abroad. When the payment of a quarterly installment is postponed at the request of a taxpayer there is added as part of such installment, until paid, interest at the rate of one-half of 1 per cent a month from the date the installment would have been due if no extension had been granted.

ELECTRIC MEN WILL CONVENE

(By Associated Press)

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Mar. 1.—While trackless transportation as it may be co-ordinated with regular electric railway service will be the principal discussion before the American Electric Railway association here at the regular mid-year meeting beginning tomorrow, a new feature will be introduced in the form of an address by Mrs. Antoinette Funk of Washington on the subject "Do Women Get Off of Street Cars Backwards." Representatives of more than eight hundred electric railways will participate. The occasion is the regular Mid-Year Meeting of the association.

The public discussion of trackless transportation follows an investigation by C. D. Emmons, president of the United Railways & Electric Company of Baltimore, who will lead the discussion. Mr. Emmons has studied the question at home and abroad and made practical experiments with buses to supplement his electric car service. Whether trackless transportation can be co-ordinated with interurbans will be discussed by Harry Reid of Indianapolis, President of the Interstate Public Service Company. Paul Shoup, President of the Pacific Electric lines, will discuss the trackless transportation situation in California. E. B. Whitman, a public service commissioner of Maryland, also will speak on the subject.

The question has been under consideration for some time and Association Committees and individual members have been making a careful study of the question, and some definite attitude is expected to be taken at the meeting. Public relations, safety work and taxation will be other subjects discussed by Samuel Insull of Chicago, Fielders Sanders, Street Railway Commissioner of Cleveland, and Britton I. Bahl, President of the Metropolitan West Side Elevated Railway of Chicago will speak.

CHARGES SUSTAINED.

VOCATIONAL WORK IS TOPIC

(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Mar. 1.—Vocational education that really educates and state unity of control in education were emphasized as essentials of state school work by Ernest W. Butterfield, Commissioner of Education of New Hampshire, before the National Council of State Department of Education, in session here today.

Some advocates of vocational training, according to Mr. Butterfield, erroneously interpret it along trade school lines. "Too much shop work at school, he said, leaves little time for American culture, giving a vocational 'education' that 'fails to educate.'" Centralized state control of education is necessary, said Mr. Butterfield, if fullest efficiency is to be obtained. Each state, he said, should have a single board of control and a single responsible officer of administration. The state board should be at the same time a state board of vocational education, board of classical education and board of any other form of education which has state approval. Similarly, he added, the superintendent of public instruction should be the director and administrative head of public education in all forms. Another reason he gave for a United States organization is "to reduce the overhead charge which comes from dual."

Government Given Decision In Land Case by High Court

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1.—The supreme court affirmed judgment of \$18,204 and cost in favor of the government against Willard N. Jones in a suit to recover homestead lands of the former Siletz Indian reservation, Oregon, which the government charged Jones obtained by using civil war veterans to locate.

EDITORS ON CAMPUS.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Mar. 1.—It is not often that three generations of editors of two different publications are in the university at the same time, but such is now the case. A picture to be featured in the Oregonian year book, of the editors of the Emerald and the Oregonian for the last three years was taken yesterday. BURIED FORTUNE.

(By Associated Press) AUGUSTA, Me., Mar. 1.—Maps and charts of an isolated island in the south seas on which treasure worth \$50,000,000 is said to have been buried in 1850 are in the possession of Mrs. James Bruce, widow of a sea captain who died here three years ago. These are the papers which Frederick Mance, a newspaper correspondent of this city, has offered to obtain for Prof. Horace H. Dill of the University of Iowa, who is to cruise the south seas next year in search of museum material.

MINE CHANGES HANDS.

BAKOR, Mar. 1.—Jim Dickson, of Greenhorn, has deeded two claims in the Greenhorn district, containing iron ore, to the Sumpter Valley Smelting Company. The ore contains gold and silver values and are considered a valuable acquisition to the holdings of the smelting company in the plans for operating the smelter at Sulphur.

CARIBBEAN MAP ISSUED

WASHINGTON, Mar. 1.—The National Geographic Society has just issued a map giving a comprehensive idea of all the countries and islands surrounding the Caribbean Sea, including Mexico, Central America, the West Indies and the Northern portion of South America along the Caribbean.

Most of these countries have been available heretofore in separate maps, and sometimes grouped, but it has been difficult to bring all of them together, whereas the new map covers the entire range of surrounding countries.
