## NEW ART CAME FROM THE U. S.

(By Associated Press)  
PARIS, Mar. 7.—The praises of American architects whose work he describes as a "new art in the truest sense of the word," are sung by George Wybo, a young French architect, in the columns of the Intransigent.

The old skyscrapers of New York, he says, "are not always the happiest examples of architectural conception," but the newer office buildings erected within the last ten or 15 years are described as "impeccable in execution, well proportioned, possessing harmonious lines, with decorative elements of sober taste, constructed of splendid materials fluently fashioned."

The sight of these buildings cause the Frenchman to recognize the existence of a new art "in the truest sense of the word, an art capable of making us feel strong emotions similar to those awakened within us by the power and splendor of our cathedrals and certain monuments of the past in Europe."

Referring to the tremendous temples of commerce, M. Wybo says, "all these buildings are different from one another, but each in its own style, in its construction, form and architectural lines is undeniably a masterpiece."

"It is regrettable that we French so ready to welcome decadent art, do not even know the names of the decorators, sculptors and architects of modern New York. All these artists, working with intelligence and method, have progressively freed themselves from worn out conventions and, discarding simple elements of decoration, have succeeded rapidly in laying down the rules of an art of which we are seeing now only the early manifestations and which, to our honor, is a direct emanation of our own French styles."

"There is a tendency back toward the old ballad songs we heard 15 years ago but these will never be the same old, sweet things they were in those days," added Miss Schroeder. "There will be more brightness and life. I believe that a new and distinctive type of American music will result."

Mr. Dower agreed in this, adding that even today, many of the popular American songs are being transplanted into the language of France where American music made a hit during the war.

General demand for classical music is finding expression in the interweaving of masterpieces with the present day dance music, they said. "The Spring Song," Rubenstein's "Melody in F," and the melodies of Rimsky-Korsakoff (in the "Song of India," for instance) are thus finding popular audiences. Negro and oriental music are also maintaining their influence. These, fused in the crucible of the dance hall, are to produce the American music—a bright and new type of song.

The Daily Palo Alto said that a paper published at the University of Nevada has started a campaign among western colleges to choose nicknames for the varsity teams.

## WETS AND DRIES ARE FIGHTING

(By Associated Press)  
WARSAW, Mar. 7.—The "wets" and "drys" are having a hot conflict over proposals to restrict the use of intoxicants in Poland. The movement for more rigid control over the use of liquor is becoming active. Newspapers are full of discussions of the question and there are numerous lectures on alcoholism while moving pictures are shown to promote the reform movement.

The example of America is continuously cited with heated arguments as to whether prohibition is effective in that country.

The "drys" advocate a regulation cutting down the number of places where liquor is sold by restricting them to one for over 2,500 population. Another proposal would abolish all places where liquor alone is sold but grant permits to cafes and restaurants.

A steady dry movement has been going on for some time in the national parliament and the debates there have lately been made more heated by enforcement of an order

disance establishing a dry Sunday in Warsaw. It forbids the sale of liquors from Saturday noon to Monday noon and is being enforced by the Warsaw police with an iron hand, despite the protests of cafe and restaurant proprietors.

One of the active figures in the campaign is General Joseph Haller, president of the Polish Red Cross and Polish Boy Scouts, who organized and commanded the famous Haller army in which thousands of American volunteers of Polish blood fought in 1917 and 1918.

General Haller is now leading a fight against raising the percentage of alcohol in beer. This is now fixed at two and one-half percent. The brewers have consented to this restriction.

Poland has just put a tax of 20 per cent on all retail liquor stocks. Polish law makes a liquor dealer assume the responsibility for drunkenness by providing that when an intoxicated person is arrested, the proprietor of the place in which he purchased his intoxicants must go along with him to jail.

## HANDCUFF MAN PASSES AWAY

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 7.—Police men of San Francisco lost a friend in the recent death here of Albert Fallon, property owner, who made handcuffs his hobby and who presented about 400 sets of the steel wristlets to local officers.

Fallon made a study of handcuffs, considering them an extremely important part of the police equipment. Whenever a new policeman was assigned to a beat on which Fallon had property, the latter would invariably get acquainted with this officer and send him a pair of handcuffs.

Fallon, it was said, loved to repeat stories told him by policemen of their experiences with handcuffs. Each year he sent for catalogues showing the new styles and would discuss the changes made in their manufacture.

COMPOSER DEAD

LONDON, Mar. 7.—Luigi Denza, composer of "Funicoli Funicola," which has been translated into almost every civilized language, has just died in London, age 76. "Funicoli Funicola" originally was a Neapolitan dialect song and was composed by Denza in 1886 at the opening of the railway up Mount Vesuvius. Denza was born in Italy and was the composer of numerous musical works.

## JAZZ TO BE CIVILIZED

FARGO, N. D., Mar. 7.—Swept into a mass of pagan measures by the great god Jazz, America is going to civilize this barbarian deity and turn him to her own uses.

When they have taught him polite ways they expect to introduce him into cultured circles, where it is believed his native "pep," coupled with his newly acquired graces will make him friends.
