the city is entitled to that amount, but they feel that inasmuch as they overlooked the deal at \$30,000, that they might be criticised by their constituents if they paid more than that amount now.

In order to give the City Commission some justification for taking less than \$37,500.00 for the building the County Court declared their intention of circulating a petition among the larger taxpayers of La Grande asking them to bring pressure to bear on the City Commission to get them to take \$30,000.00. The County Court however made the statement that if the settlement was that the City should get more than \$20,000 that it would have no bearing on the case as far as they were concerned.

The County Court will meet with the City Commission at their next meeting to be held in the City building, March 8th, at 7:30 p. m. and the question will be decided "Shall the Taxpayers of the City of La Grande lose \$7,500.00 for the benefit of the County at large," and it is every taxpayers duty to turn out and give your Commissioners your ideas in the matter.

France Will Pay Her Debts Says Jusserand

WASHINGTON, Mar. 3.—Declaration that there are 30,000,000 citizens of France who stand behind the nations war-contracted obligations, was made by Jules Jusserand, French ambassador to the United States, speaking Wednesday at the opening session here of the National Rivers and Harbors congress.

"I read the other day where there was one man in France opposed to payment of our debts," said the ambassador, "and I want to say that there are 30,000,000 loyal Frenchmen who stand squarely behind France's obligations, and I am one of the 30,000,000."

GRAND OPERA IS POPULAR

Chicago Grand Opera Company Assured of Big Welcome to Northwest Near End of Month.

PORTLAND, Mar. 3.—With mail orders for tickets pouring in from all over the Northwest, the engagement of Mary Garden and the world famous Chicago Opera company of 311 persons at the Public Auditorium March 22 to 25, is an assured success, according to word that has gone out from the offices at the Auditorium. Already practically every city and town in the Northwest is represented in the mail order list.

The Chicago company closed its annual engagement in New York February 25, and started immediately on its annual tour, traveling in three special passenger trains de luxe and one special train of 17 baggage cars of scenery, costumes, etc. The western season will be opened at Portland March 22. The only other cities on the coast to be visited by the company are San Francisco and Los Angeles.

The Portland contract calls for the entire Chicago company and all its equipment and love of the company's greatest operas, Mamma Vanna, Lohengrin (in English), Romeo and Juliet, Thais and Aida. The company will come with 45 world stars including Mary Garden, Lucien Muratore, Edith Maceo, Rosa Tulas, Georges Baklanoff, Forrest Lamont, Margery Maxwell and many other world stars; an orchestra of 70 pieces; a chorus of 70, ballet of 30.

SPOKANE WANTS AUTO CARAVAN

SPOKANE, Wash., Mar. 3.—William D. Scott, who last September arrived at Buhl, Idaho, from New York with a caravan of 28 families of homeseekers, is to bring a second party west this year for settlement in the Spokane valley.

The new expedition will contain more than 50 families and number over 200 persons. The caravan will leave New York late in July and reach Spokane in September, as the journey, like last year's, will be made by automobile.

Mr. Scott was an advertising man in Brooklyn for a number of years. On a trip west he was impressed with an idea—that of coming to this region by motor caravan, as the pioneers travelled in their prairie schooners. He discussed his idea with Governor Davis of Idaho, and learned desirable land for farming was available near Buhl, in the southern part of the state.

So many people, friends and friends of Mr. Scott, wanted to make the trip, that Mr. Scott was forced to set up a standard of eligibility—\$3,000 in cash and an automobile per family. Even then hundreds of applications were received. From the list, 128 families were chosen, and 25 selected to make the journey.

The trip was an entire success, so much so that Mr. Scott looks forward to this year's caravan with considerable confidence. The caravan left New York July 28, and reached Buhl, 3,093 miles away, in late September.

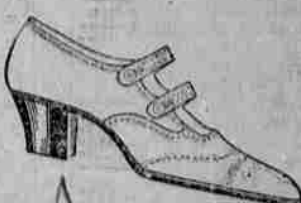
