INDIAN GIRL TO VISIT CHINA

LAWRENCE, Kas., Mar. 3.—Ruth Muskrat, a Cherokee Indian girl from Oklahoma who is a student at the University of Kansas here, will visit China this spring as a delegate to the World's Student Christian Federation Conference at Peking, April 4.

The hope of the conference, Miss Muskrat explained recently, is to get students of various parts of the world in vital touch with each other and, among other things, solve the problems confronting Chinese students who have become imbued with Occidental ideas.

Miss Muskrat, who is 17, has done Y. W. C. A. work in New Mexico and worked among her people in religious and educational work.

"The primary need of my people," Miss Muskrat declared, "is trained native leadership—Indians, themselves, who understand the peculiarities of the tribe and can work with them."

"Indian women are more capable in most respects than the men. They know better how to barter—they are shrewder. This is an outgrowth of the time when women raised the crops. The men go in more for social activities. If I have a party, I can always count on the men attending. But if I want to put on a financial drive, I appeal to the women."

Fifty-seven nations will be represented at the student conference in Peking, and will represent more than 200,000 students throughout the world, she said. After the conference, delegates will visit the principal universities of Japan and China.

Miss Muskrat, who says her father is Cherokee and her mother Irish, will be the second Indian ever elected a delegate to an international student conference. She goes as a guest of the national board of the Young Women's Christian Association.

NEW RAILWAY FOR WENATCHEE

WENATCHEE, Wash., Mar. 3.—Announcement that the Great Northern railway is planning new facilities and extensive improvements at Wenatchee, involving a possible expenditure of \$500,000, will have no deterrent effect on the efforts of the promoters of the Wenatchee Southern Railway.

The Great Northern has purchased fifty acres of land south of the city, including two tracts over which the Wenatchee Southern had already surveyed its right of way. According to the Wenatchee men, this may cause some slight modification of the surveys for the Wenatchee Southern line, but it will not change the general purpose.

The survey for the Wenatchee Southern has been completed all the way from Wenatchee to Kennewick, following the west bank of the Columbia river. Estimates have been made of construction costs; the major portion of the right of way has been obtained, and the deeds are ready to be placed on file.

The new railway's application for a certificate of necessity has been received by the Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington, D. C., and has been referred to Governor Hart and the state public service commission for recommendation. The project thus is brought practically to the point of final determination.

Backed by the Pomona grange of Chelan county and the Wenatchee Commercial club, the Wenatchee Southern company was incorporated in October, 1920. The specific purpose of the railway was to build a

line to connect up every transcontinental railway in the state. This line will be comparatively short, less than a hundred miles, exclusive of parts of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, which will be used between a point 33 miles south of Wenatchee, and Hanford, 47 miles away. The line would then be built from Hanford to Richland, on the Northern Pacific, a distance of 21 miles, and on, eight miles further, into Kennewick, connecting with the Oregon & Washington about five miles west of Kennewick.

It is believed that the saving in transportation of central Washington fruit crops on the new railroad will pay for it, the estimated loss from transportation delays having been estimated in 1919 at \$5,000,000.
