

AID ON INCOME TAX IS GIVEN

Revenue Bureau Agent Here To Aid In Making Returns and Unravel Many Difficulties of Taxpayers

H. C. Payne, division chief of income tax, with the Internal Revenue Bureau, arrived in La Grande Thursday from Baker and has established his quarters in Room 222 in the Federal Building.

He will be in La Grande to March 9, inclusive, with office hours from nine o'clock to five thirty.

"I will be glad to give any help or information regarding the income tax," states Mr. Payne, "but it is well to endeavor to see me as soon as possible, as I will be able to handle your problems in a more detailed manner now than just before I leave, as the count of the number who will wait until the last minute to interview me."

A letter has just been received from headquarters stating that: The only extension of time granted has been for partnership and public service corporations who file on Form 1065, for fiduciaries who file on Form 1041, and for 1920's and 1921's only in connection with fiduciary or partnership returns. No extension has been granted to corporations who file on Form 1020.

O.-W. IS SUED FOR DAMAGES

Victims of Cello Smashing Ask Reparation from Railroad Whose Trains Crashed.

McMINNVILLE, Ore., Mar. 3.—Forty-two thousand five hundred dollars is the aggregate amount asked by Lloyd Cole of this city in three separate actions against the O.W. R. & N. company for injuries in the railroad wreck at Cello last December.

In one action he is suing the company for \$7500 as administrator of the estate of his 4-year-old son, Jack Lloyd Cole, alleging that the death of his son was due to the negligence of the company. This action has been brought in the Wasco county circuit court.

The other two actions, in which Cole is suing the company in Multnomah county, are for the loss of services and companionship of his wife, Beta E. Cole, and son, Jack Cole. Mrs. Cole was injured. He asks \$25,000 on this cause of action. The other action is for \$10,000. Mrs. Cole has brought an action in her own name in the Wasco county circuit court for \$100,000.

Fire This Noon Put Out by Garden Hose

About twelve o'clock the roof on J. C. Blackinton's residence at 1202 B avenue caught fire, caused by a defective fuse, and the fire alarm was turned in. Mr. Blackinton got his garden hose into action and managed to extinguish the fire in a short time. The damage resulting from the blaze was small, amounting to approximately \$25.

The fire department's truck got a quick start and was making record speed until they reached the last stretch of road near the house. In an attempt to get around where they could play their stream more effectively the truck struck a bad spot in the road and very nearly turned over. It was firmly mired in and took over an hour before it could be extricated.
