Bishop Sumner Not Expected to Resign

PORTLAND, Mar. 9.—Bishop Walter Taylor Sumner, of the Episcopal diocese of Oregon, is not expected to resign his office. Neither can he, under the laws of the church, be transferred to another field. Hence the only means of removing him, as sought by a committee of Portland laymen with Graham Glass as chairman, is to prefer charges against him and prove them before a board of bishops duly appointed.
Such is the situation in the controversy which has been raging for some time and which gained added force when the bishop recently demanded the resignation of Dean Hielek of St. Stephen's Pro-cathedral on account of personal feeling. This was later withdrawn, but the dean has now resigned, effective April 1.
J. W. Lethaby, executive secretary of the Oregon diocese, yesterday assured the public by an informal statement that to talk about Bishop Sumner resigning is absurd.

Broccoli Raising Is To Be Studied

WASHINGTON, D. C., Mar. 9.—A representative of the department of agriculture now on the Pacific coast has been ordered to go to Roseburg, Ore., and arrange for a study of broccoli, or winter cauliflower, in shipment. It appears that broccoli promises big results for farmers and gardeners in the Umpqua valley, but they are handicapped by the fact that the outside leaves take on a dead color in transit, which scares the eastern housewife away from it when she is making the market purchases.
Another department expert will instruct southern Oregon fruit growers in the use of greased paper for packing pears, and still another will experiment in the growth of Manchurian walnuts in the Willamette valley.
