DR. BOUVY IS HOME AGAIN FROM EUROPE

was taking place we wandered from our course and in attempting to return to the course, going full speed under the force of only one propeller, the ship nearly turned over.

"We arrived at Glasgow without further misfortune and found conditions in Scotland and England in a very bad shape due to the curtailment of the ship building industry. We journeyed up the river Clyde for twenty miles and during the entire distance the shore was lined with inactive shipyards. This lack of employment has caused a great deal of hardship and poverty, which is very noticeable on the street of the cities. In London we saw many numbers of people sleeping on doorsteps and buildings and in the heart of London two of the largest churches throw open their doors each night, permitting the use of their pews for beds. They are filled to the limit every evening. "Practically all the hospitals are run by public subscriptions instead of endowment as is customary in the United States and the conditions are such that these hospitals will be forced to shut down unless the British government comes to their aid.

"In Belgium the conditions are somewhat better. Not so much unemployment is prevalent and a great deal of the evidences of the war period have been cleared up. Occasionally a farmer while plowing will unearth a buried soldier. If he is a German he is left as he is, but if a soldier of the Allies the government will be notified and a proper burial will be given him.

"France has not recovered as has her little sister Belgium. One notices more or less unrest, prices are extremely high and they have not made the effort to rebuild their ruined cities and clear away the debris left in the wake of the war.

"In Switzerland the conditions look very good. Prices are also high and considerable unemployment still exists. This is due partly to the low price of labor in Austria and Germany. The Swiss watches are manufactured in Germany and Austria and are then sent to Switzerland to be stamped and assembled.

"Italy seems to have an air of satisfaction. The Italians are a home-loving people and have cleared away the signs of war and have rebuilt many small cities. In Rome I was surprised to find one of the best equipped and conducted hospitals that I had ever seen and in addition to their regular work they do a great amount of research work.

"The conditions are very bad in Austria, in fact they are so bad that I am unable to represent them to you. The poverty has brought on innumerable diseases and the hospitals and clinics are overcrowded. Where before the war there was 300 to 400 American physicians doing post graduate work there are now only about 25 or 30.

"The American doctors are very well received and are treated with the utmost courtesy. Vienna itself, where we spent some time, is overcrowded with foreigners who are taking advantage of the low rate of exchange. The Viennese do not welcome this class of people.

"We were in Vienna during the great riot in which about 20,000 of the anarchistic class took part, and the hotel in which we were stopping was attacked and partially demolished. Fortunately we escaped molestation and were able to secure our regular meals—although they were served in our bathroom as the windows in the other rooms had been broken and the cold kept these rooms in a bad state. In a short time the hotel was repaired and we again were able to live in some luxury.

"During the riot the American consul rushed into the hotel to see if we were all right and he advised us to leave Austria immediately. The riot-

ing, which damaged millions of dollars worth of property, was still raging, though with less intensity, when we left Vienna about a week later.

"We returned to Paris and then went to Germany. At Cologne I finished the work I had started while in Vienna and then returned to Paris, where I worked with Dr. le Maître, at the hospital St. Louis, which was built by the American Red Cross. This hospital specializes on nose and throat trouble among ex-soldiers who were wounded during the war. New noses, new lower jaws and new ears are so cleverly constructed that they are not noticeable at a distance of ten feet.

"The conditions in Germany do not show poverty and lack of control as does Austria. "We sailed from Cherbourg on the S. S. George Washington, formerly a German ship but now in the service of the United States. We experienced an uneventful voyage and arrived in New York as per schedule. We returned to La Grande by the California route and while in Los Angeles we met W. Bollons and his daughter, Theda; Mr. and Mrs. M. J. Buckley and Mr. and Mrs. William Siegrist and their daughter. Mr. Bouvy will remain in Portland for a short time and will then return to La Grande."

Allocation of Wave Lengths Is Decided Upon by Committee

Amateurs are Taken Into Consideration by Government; Commercial Regulation Is Also Made.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 10.—Allocation of 20 wave lengths among various classes of wireless telephone senders and government control of all commercial wireless transmitting telephone stations was recommended by the committee of the government radio conference today.

The recommendations do not provide for government control of receiving stations. Amateur transmitting stations should be given the exclusive use of wave lengths from 150 to 200 meters and share with technical and training schools wave lengths from 200 to 275 meters.
