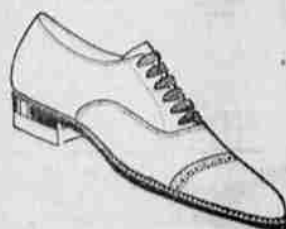

HEAD OF FARM BLOC TELLS OF CONDITIONS

cial system, devised to fit business, not agriculture, is that the farmer must often market under the most unfavorable conditions.

Marketing Troubles. "Next come the problems of marketing. One of the biggest things this government can do, I believe, is to shape up a new and efficient code or system of marketing its agricultural products. This is in the interest of the consumer as much as of the producer.

"Today the United States has the costliest and most inefficient system of marketing of any country in the world.

"That the farm bloc has been able to get things done is due to the fact that the things for which it has fought have been fundamentally correct. Among the more notable of these measures have been:

"First: The Capper-Volstead cooperative marketing bill.

"Second: The future trading bill regulating grain exchanges.

"Third: The revival of the War Finance Corporation as an aid to helping move farm products.

"Fourth: Increasing funds available for loans by the Farm Loan Board by \$50,000,000.

"Fifth: Passage by the Senate of the bill giving agriculture a representative on the Federal Reserve Board.

"The farm bloc is going to allow no letup in its activities. There is a big job ahead, and the biggest proposition is to work out a constructive
