Senatorial Race Interesting. If the conditions materialize according to the reports today there will be a red-hot fight for the joint senatorship from Union, Umatilla and Morrow counties, the office now held by Senator Eberhard. He has the prestige of being the present senator, while Mr. Sloan has served with an excellent record in the house and is considered one of the most substantial men of that body. Senator Eberhard has been on the ways and means committees both sessions, on the educational committee, and a number of other important committees. Sloan held important committee positions in the house and was one of the foremost men of that body.

Both men, Senator Eberhard and Mr. Sloan, are good friends and the contest will be one of great interest to all.

There may be changes yet in the plans but this seems to be the very latest in the Eastern Oregon situation.
