JOSEPH HONORS BASKETBALLERS

JOSEPH, Mar. 15.—Joseph gave a community dinner Monday night in honor of the champion basketball team of the eighth district. For a while Joseph held third place in the district and seemed in a fair way to lose out. When it was found they had to win the last three games, all hard ones—one with Haines, who had won from them at Haines, and the other two with Enterprise, whose team was in the lead and would hold first place if Joseph lost even one of the three games. Joseph won out against Haines February 17 and the contest narrowed down and became of the most intense interest in the valley. On March 4th a game was played at Joseph before the largest crowd of the season and resulted in a complete victory for Joseph, with a score of 41 to 30. The following week basketball held the center of the stage in both towns and despite bad roads a large number of people from Joseph went down to Enterprise Saturday evening, March 11, to cheer the team. Both teams were nervous but nevertheless one of the hardest games of the season was played, with Enterprise mostly in the lead, but always so close that until the last moment the decision was uncertain. When the score stood at 28 to 28, Mays of Joseph made a basket just as a foul was called on Enterprise. Joseph lost that basket but McCully, with the free throw, made the basket just before time was called, leaving Joseph the victors by one point.
The Enterprise lads were game and have the admiration of both towns for their sportsmanlike losing.
At the dinner all basketball boys were given seats of honor, the second team having worked as hard as the first in the training. Speeches were made by Mayor Swartwood, Mr. Shauff, Superintendent Jory, Rev. Wallis, Sam Ames, and Assistant Coach Harry Nagrum.
The boys left on Tuesday's train.
