CHURCH PEOPLE WELCOME WOMEN

For First Time Methodist Church Allows Feminine Sex To Sit In General Conference.

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., Mar. 15.—Women will sit as members for the first time at the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South which will begin its sessions here May 3 with 261 ministerial delegates and 179 lay delegates in attendance.

At the last quadrennial gathering of the general conference, in Atlanta, in 1918, six bishops were elected, but it is predicted that as many more will be chosen at the approaching conference. Among those who are mentioned for the episcopacy are Dr. W. W. Pinson, general secretary of the board of missions; Dr. W. R. Beauchamp, secretary of the mission board in charge of the new work in Europe; Dr. Stonewall Anderson, general secretary of the educational board; Dr. E. B. Chappell, general secretary and editor of the Sunday school board; D. O. E. Goldard, secretary of evangelism on the mission board; Dr. T. N. Ivey, editor

of the Nashville Christian Advocate; Dr. J. S. Chadwick, now in charge of the Centenary publicity work; Dr. F. N. Parker of Emory University; Dr. H. A. Bosa, president of the Southwestern University of Dallas; Dr. C. C. Sealeman, Dallas; Dr. J. E. Dickey, of Atlanta; Dr. S. C. H. Burgin of Louisville, secretary of the church extension board; Dr. Sam Hay of Houston, Texas.

Matters of legislation which may come before the general conference include limiting the terms of bishops to four years; abolishing the office of presiding elder, or providing for their appointment by their respective annual conference and not by the presiding bishops; revision of the creed to make it read "Church of God," instead of "Holy Catholic Church," changing the denominational name, and authorization for a financial campaign to secure not less than \$10,000,000 to provide for worn out preachers and other conference claimants.

Bishop E. R. Hendrix of Kansas City, as senior active bishop, is expected to call the Hot Springs general conference to order. The conference will be the nineteenth in the history of the Southern church. Bishops who have died since the last general conference are Bishops W. J. McCoy, Walter R. Lambuth and Henry C. Morrison.

MINES ARE IN PRIVATE HANDS

RIGA, Mar. 15.—Siberian mining and industrial properties are rapidly passing into private hands, says a dispatch from the Russian official telegraph agency at Moscow. The Siberian department of the Supreme Economic council reported, that up to December 1, 1921, out of 130 lease agreements signed, 79 were to private concerns.

Three gold "trusts" or working combines wherein a number of mines are to be operated by government agencies conducted along commercial lines, have just been formed in Siberia. Salt and metal "trusts" have also been formed and a number of so-called "autonomous" combines, privately directed, have been created under names long familiar on European stock exchanges.

RUBLES ALWAYS INSUFFICIENT

MOSCOW, Mar. 15.—One of the paradoxes of Russia's depreciated currency is that there is never enough rubles in circulation to accommodate trade demands. Prices so increased in January that a new supply of paper money was required and in that month the government printed an issue of

15,000,000,000,000 rubles in denominations ranging from 10,000,000 rubles to 100,000,000 ruble notes. The Minister of Finance has promised the Soviet congress that he will print up to 25,000,000,000,000 rubles during the present year but said he doubted whether this would be enough. Before free trade was permitted last summer the number of rubles in circulation was estimated at 4,000,000,000,000.

The new national bank is making large loans to promote business. Up to January 15 it had loaned 93,350,000,000 rubles to government factors and co-operative and private concerns.
