WAR VETERAN CENSUS PLANNED

Local Post of American Legion Will Take Census and Gather Data on Adjusted Compensation.

At its meeting here this week American Legion Post No. 43 decided to begin taking a census of world war veterans in this section at an early date, probably sometime next week. The purpose of this census is to secure data for the national organization regarding service and adjusted compensation. It is being undertaken by all posts in the country. The local post will hire a census taker and expects to have the work completed within a short time.

A house-to-house and farm-to-farm canvass of every city block and township in Union county will be made. Every veteran will be interviewed, asked forty-eight questions and his answers recorded.

It, and "George" as usual has stayed around the corner. This is the condition that the rotating loan fund of the Legion has been designed to remedy, and the Legionnaires are confident that the same old spirit that brought in wounded comrades under fire will not be found "around the corner" in the relieving of the ex-service man in distress.

All veterans are to be sought out whether members of any soldiers' organization or not. The matter of their membership in the Legion is of no consequence. The fact is that there is no other organization of sufficient scope to undertake and carry through a national census of veterans, and with the very apparent need of such a census the Legion has taken it up.

The recording of what choice each veteran will make under the five alternatives provided for in the Adjusted Compensation bill will be a very important result of the census. This question is to be asked of every ex-serviceman in the community. The bill offers the soldier his option of any one of the five following provisions for compensation: (1) Adjusted pay for the term of service put in; (2) a paid-up 20-year insurance policy; (3) expenses paid for a course in vocational training; (4) a loan for the purchase of a farm or home; (5) application of man's adjusted pay on the purchase of government improved land.

The adjusted pay is to be set at the rate of \$1.00 a day for home service and \$1.25 a day for service overseas. The face value of the life insurance policy offered is to be 3.28 times the amount that would be received by the same man as adjusted pay. His vocational training aid or farm or home loan would be 140 per cent of what he would receive in cash.

All back claims against the government are likewise to be entered in the Legion census. If a man did not get his \$50 bonus on discharge he is requested to make it known. If the government owes him back pay, travel pay, if his allotments or liberty bonds have gone astray, if he has never received his Victory medal, he is to enter his complaint on the Legion questionnaire. "We want to know everything that every ex-service man has got coming to him," is the word that has come from State Headquarters at Portland. That is what the local post is going after.

SAY THEY WILL LIVE BY RULE

Kansas City Business Men Declare Golden Rule Will Guide Them in Future.

(By Associated Press.) KANSAS CITY, Mar. 16.—With the object to practice "the Golden Rule in all commercial relations between ourselves and all men," the Business Men's Christian Unity is organizing on a national scale, and now has branches in nearly twenty large cities.

With no dues or assessments, and the bond of membership the acceptance of a business creed that "we are banded together to help one another in all ways, but especially to realize that God is the source of all our prosperity and that we must, in the end, all demonstrate his laws in our affairs," the scope of the association is declared to be "the commercial relations of the whole world."

"Loving service shall be the keynote of our commercial ambition, rather than personal gain," says the preamble of the organization, which has associations in New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington, St. Louis, Spokane, Lincoln, Neb., Tulsa and Pawhuska, Okla., Omaha, Sioux City, Seattle, Los Angeles, Oakland, Denver and Kansas City. Others are forming. Conceived as an organization of Christian business men in one city, the idea sponsored by the original association spread to other cities, until now the movement has become nation-wide, and is being organized on an extensive scale.

The declarations adopted by the Kansas City association, which are similar to those used in other cities, follow:

"The object of this association shall be to practice the Golden Rule in business. God's fundamental laws as taught and demonstrated by Jesus Christ shall be the foundation and rule of action of this association."

"The primal aim and object shall be to search out and apply the laws of God in all commercial relations between ourselves and all men."

"The scope of this association shall be the commercial relations of the whole world, to the end that uniform prosperity, efficiency, equity, honesty, justice, and fair dealing shall be established everywhere and in every relation of life."

"Loving service shall be the keynote of our commercial ambition, rather than personal gain."

"We are banded together to help one another in all ways, but especially to realize that God is the source of all our prosperity and that we must, in the end, all demonstrate his laws in our affairs."

"All members agree to make the Golden Rule the sole basis of their conduct in their relations with one another and with all people."
