MIXED JURY DISCHARGED

TRENTON, N. J., Mar. 17.—Unable to agree upon a verdict, Mercer county's second mixed jury to remain locked up together all night was discharged Tuesday in supreme court.
It heard a suit for damages against the public service railway company.

Whereas the members of the last mixed jury told conflicting stories as to how they spent the night, some of them admitting that they played cards and took naps Tuesday's jury apparently had agreed upon a policy of silence, as not one word was forthcoming as to how the deliberations were conducted.

Three of the women of the jury were members of the mixed jury of last week which also was unable to agree on a verdict.
Five of the jurors discharged were married women and their husbands were in court when they reported.

WIFE LEFT OUT OF DAY'S WILL

WALLACE, Ida., Mar. 17.—The will of Eugene H. Day, wealthy mining operator of this city who died last month, leaves to each of his two brothers and two sisters a fourth interest in his estate and makes no mention of his wife, from whom he had been separated prior to his death.

The will, executed in 1910, was filed for probate Monday. Under the Idaho law, Mrs. Day will receive half of all community property. The brothers are Harry L. Day of Berkeley, Cal., and Jerome J. Day of Moscow, Idaho, and the sisters are Mrs. Eleanor Bernice Boyce and Mrs. Blanch Eloise Ellis of Portland, Ore. Mrs. Eugene H. Day also is a resident of Portland.

No valuation was placed upon the estate which it is believed consists of large mining and similar holdings.
