JAPANESE ASKED TO REGISTER

HONOLULU, T. H., Mar. 16. — Japanese who are citizens of the United States by virtue of their birth on American soil were urged to register and vote for "the best man in politics," in a farewell statement issued by Chonosuke Yada, consul-general here for the past 18 months, prior to his departure to assume his new post of Minister to Siam.

"I hope that the American citizens of Japanese parentage at Hawaii will learn to love and respect the community in which they live and contribute toward its enhancement," the statement said. "While, as a representative of the Japanese government, I do not wish to discuss political matters affecting this territory, I believe that the leaders of American citizens of Japanese parentage should not lose a moment in arousing and awakening their fellow citizens to the importance of registering and voting. They should vote for the best man in politics."

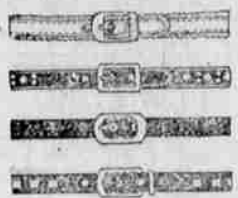

GUSTAVO WINS FROM HINDU

Won In Two Straight Falls Last Night; Winner Had Four Pounds More Weight.

Ad Gustavo won from Basanta Singh last night at the Star Theatre in two straight falls, the first in 36 minutes and 10 seconds on an arm scissors and headlock and the second in 13 minutes and 42 seconds with a double arm scissors.

Ad Gustavo weighed approximately 160 pounds ringside and Basanta Singh weighed 156 pounds. E. E. Vehr, of Elgin, was the third man in the ring in the evening's main event. Both wrestlers stepped into the ring and were introduced, both drawing much applause.

At the ring of the bell both men advanced and for a period of nearly five minutes head wrestled, then Singh took the aggressive and for another five minutes the two men were about even. Then Gustavo took the offensive and for many minutes Singh thrilled the audience by breaking many of Gustavo's best holds, but finally, at the end of 36 minutes and 10 seconds, Gustavo pinned him to the mat with an arm scissors and a headlock for the first fall.

After a few minutes' rest the two men again went to the mat, Singh taking a fierce offensive and for a short time it appeared as if he was coming back with a vengeance. But this was short lived and Gustavo clamped a double arm scissors on the Hindu that

won the second straight fall in 13 minutes and 42 seconds.

Singh then challenged Gustavo to wrestle at any future time, both men making the middleweight weight, which is 158 pounds, and agreed to put up \$100 to \$500 on the outcome.

Immediately after the main event, Referee Vehr announced that Ed Stevens would meet Kid Sarp at the Star Theatre on Thursday, April 6, at the Star Theatre. Also, that L. W. Bradford challenges M. L. Hooper to a finish contest. Bradford weighs 140 pounds.

Preliminary to the main event the first mixed wrestling and boxing bout ever held in La Grande was staged. Frankie LaRose was scheduled to meet O. D. Scott but LaRose failed to make his appearance, owing to illness, and Homer Graham, a husky local fireman took LaRose's place.

In the first round of the contest Scott threw Graham several times but was unable to hold him to the mat. Graham landed several ineffective blows. In the second round Graham failed to land a blow but was still able to prevent Scott from pinning his shoulders to the mat. In the third round Graham landed two blows and was then downed. Scott won his fall in two minutes in the third round, each round being four minutes in length. M. L. Hooper refereed this match.

In the first preliminary M. L. Hooper wrestled with Claude Landry and won two straight falls from him, the first in 15 minutes and 40 seconds with a front headlock, and the second in 7 minutes and 14 seconds with a body scissors and a quarter nelson. Landry showed up well but was unable to cope with Hooper's experience.

A fair sized crowd was in attendance and were brought to their feet many times during the final go. This wrestling card was one of the best ever brought to La Grande and was

BOOTLEGGERS ARE ORGANIZED

SPOKANE, Wash., Mar. 17. — Bootleggers of Spokane have organized, according to police information. Virtually all bootleggers in the city are reported to have "joined up" and agreed to raise the price for Scotch and gin from \$8 to \$10 a quart, three quarts for \$25, an not cut the price. NEW SWIMMING RECORD MADE

(By Associated Press) SYDNEY, N. S. W., Mar. 16. — Keith Kirkland, Sydney University swimmer, established a new Australian record here by swimming the 100 yards backstroke in 1:12 and 3-5ths seconds faster than the former record, which had been established by Pua Kealoha, of Hawaii, on February 12, 1921. Kealoha had won the 100 yards backstroke championship of New South Wales on January 25, 1921, very easily in 1:15.

Kirkland's performance came during a special test race conducted by the N. S. W. Amateur Swimming association to decide who will represent New South Wales at the championships at Brisbane. Kirkland took the lead in the 100 yards at the start and was a length and a half ahead of his nearest competitor at the finish.

CREW TO VISIT COOK'S GRAVE

HONOLULU, T. H., Mar. 16. — The crew of the British light cruiser, Calcutta, now here, will proceed to the island of Hawaii and anchor off Koolaukaka bay to visit the lonely spot where Captain Cook, the British navigator, who discovered and named the Hawaiian group the "Sandwich Islands," is buried. It was announced today by Captain Walter Compton, the vessel's commander.

The monument that marks Cook's grave will be cleaned and the surrounding ground will be cleared, Captain Compton said. The vessel will stay there four days. The visit to Hawaii will follow the Calcutta's voyage to Fanning Island, Washington and Christmas Islands. British possessions south of here.
