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## L. P. McCUBBIN PASSED AWAY

LOSTINE, Mar. 20.—Leander P. McCubbin died early Tuesday morning, March 20, 1922, at the home of his son Roy, at Caldwell, Idaho. He had not been very well for several years, but his last illness was of comparatively short duration. He left Enterprise to visit his sons on Monday, February 27th, and arrived at Caldwell Wednesday, and was stricken seriously ill the day he reached there passing away the following Tuesday. The body was brought to Lostine for burial last Thursday. Services at the grave were in charge of the Masonic fraternity of which Mr. McCubbin was a member for years, being identified with the Enterprise lodge.
