JURY FAILED TO AGREE IN MURDER TRIAL
 (Continued from Page One.)
 If they thought there was any possibility of reaching a verdict. Each replied in the negative. Thereupon the judge pronounced their formal discharge.
 The case was reset for next Tuesday when, Mr. Keyes announced, motion for the setting of a new trial date will be made.
 Mrs. Obenchain was returned to the women's department of the county jail. She declined to comment upon the result while in the courtroom. Her attorneys said she made no statement to them. Up to last night she had expressed herself as confident of an acquittal, but friends who visited her in the jail Sunday said she had resigned herself to a disagreement.
Jurors Silent.
 Some members of the jury said the division was on the question of guilt or innocence. They did not reach the question of degree of guilt. Other members were uncommunicative, one throwing aside a newspaper reporter who asked for a statement.
 The trial was begun February 14 last, but was delayed several times by illness of jurors and witnesses which necessitated adjournments ranging from one to three days. Mrs. Obenchain, when on the witness stand,

denied the state's assertion that she conspired with Arthur C. Burch to slay Kennedy.
 Burch was called to the stand by the prosecution and questioned concerning his actions prior to the tragedy. He replied he would not answer unless the indictment against him first was dismissed. His second trial is set for March 27 next, the first having resulted in a disagreement.
MAN HIGH IN LODGE COMING
 Pendletonian With Long List of Lodge Designations To Be Speaker at Ad Club Luncheon.

James G. Gwinn, present supreme lodge representative from the grand lodge, domain of Oregon, Knights of Pythias, past grand chancellor commander of the same domain, and one of the mile-posts in Oregon Pythianism, will come over from his home in Pendleton tomorrow to give one of the principal addresses at tomorrow noon's high links for the Ad Club. Marion Davis, of Union, who is past supreme representative and past grand chancellor, in addition to being past royal vizier of Khaled Temple No. 170, will be the other speaker. Mr. Gwinn is a Royal Prince of the Dokies.
 C. W. Moore, royal vizier, will preside tomorrow and it is necessary that proceedings begin promptly on time. Orchestra music, and a line-up of home-cooked food that would burst the most rugged tyro, will be the dinner table. While the viands will be listed on the printed menu in terms that probably only a Dokie could understand, the Dokies have tipped off enough for the Ad Clubbers to know that baked ham, done by the Macpherson Bakery, and some special Dokie pastries from the same place, will be among "those eaten."  The dinner will be served at the K. of P. hall.

WRESTLERS TO MEET AGAIN
 An agreement has been signed by Basanta Singh, Hindu wrestler, and Ad Gustavo to meet again on the mat in La Grande within 30 days. The agreement provides that the match is to be staged under the auspices of the La Grande Boxing Commission.
 Both wrestlers agree to weigh in at 158 pounds at 2 o'clock on the day of the match and the match to be a finish affair without any time limit. The best two out of three falls will win.
 A guarantee has been put up by both parties to appear on the day of the match and be within the weight limit.
 Singh contends that he will win if Gustavo meets the weight requirement and Gustavo feels that he would win if he weighed only 110 pounds.

RADIO AT ELKS IS INSTALLED
