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Mrs. R. J. Perry and her son, Thomas A. Perry, are guests at the home of Mrs. J. G. Stitzinger.

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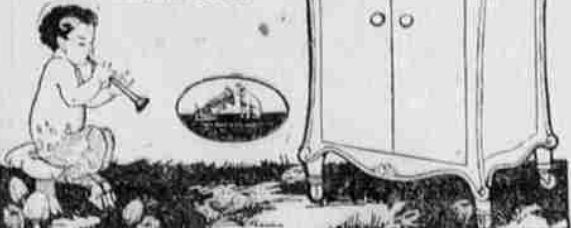
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
