SUMMONS. In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for Union County. H. Learance, M. O. Learance and M. J. Duffley, Plaintiffs; vs. D. B. Richardson, Clara Richardson, C. L. Rowe and Mary M. Rowe, Defendants.

To D. B. Richardson and Clara Richardson, the above named defendants: You and each of you are hereby notified to be and appear in the above entitled court and answer the complaint therein filed against you in the above entitled suit within six weeks from and after the date of the first publication of this summons as stated herein and you and each of you are hereby notified that if you fail so to appear and answer, the plaintiff will, for want thereof, apply to the court for the relief demanded in the complaint, to-wit: that there be decreed due and owing plaintiffs from each and all the defendants in this suit upon the notes set out in the complaint the sum of \$13,250.00 with interest thereon from the 16th day of July, 1919, at the rate of six per cent per annum, and that there be also decreed due and owing from each and all of the said defendants to plaintiffs the further sum of \$512.12 paid by plaintiffs in satisfaction of tax liens on the property described hereinafter and prior in right to plaintiffs mortgage foreclosed in this suit, with interest thereon from the 6th day of January, 1922, at the rate of six per cent per annum and the further sum of \$750.00 attorney fees and that plaintiffs mortgage set out in the complaint be decreed a valid and subsisting lien upon the lands described in the complaint in said cause and not released therefrom and prior in time and right to the interest of each and all the said defendants, for the said several sums due on said mortgage and for taxes paid and interest thereon and for attorney's fees; that the said mortgage be foreclosed and said lands be sold as by law provided and the proceeds of sale applied in satisfaction of the said sums found due on said mortgage and for taxes paid and interest thereon and attorney's fees and costs and disbursements of this suit and that all right, title and interest of defendants and each thereof in and to said lands be forever barred and foreclosed, to-wit: Commencing at a point on the section line 970 feet west of the northeast corner of section 21 in Township three, south, of Range 40 east, of Willamette Meridian in Union County, Oregon, said point being on record as the Northwest corner of Hibbler's Addition to the town of Cove, Oregon, and running thence south 108 feet, thence south 62 degrees east, 140.5 feet, thence south 38 degrees east 91.5 feet; thence south 400 feet more or less to the Cove Milling Company's water ditch, thence southeasterly along the said Cove Milling Company's water ditch to a point on the same section line 1108 feet south of the northeast corner of said section 21, thence south along the section line 212 feet more or less to the southeast corner of the northeast quarter of northeast quarter of said section 21; thence south 1320 feet more or less to the southwest corner of the said northeast quarter of the northeast quarter of said section 21; thence north 1122 feet more or less to a point 198 feet south of the northwest corner of the said northeast quarter of northeast quarter of said section 21, thence east 320 feet more or less to a point 1000 feet west and 198 feet south of the said northeast corner of said section 21; thence north to the north section line
