BONUS BILL IS PASSED BY LOWER HOUSE

(Continued from Page One.)

Vocational training adopted after January 1, 1922, at the rate of \$1.75 a day, the total payments not to exceed, however, 140 per cent of the adjusted service credit.

Farm and home aid under which veterans who purchase or improve farms or homes would be paid after July 1, 1923, a sum equal to their adjusted service credit increased by 25 per cent.

Land settlement, under which lands would be reclaimed under the supervision of a special board and farm units established for sale to the veterans at a price fixed by the board less the amount of the adjusted service credit due to the purchasers.

In only two important particulars does this measure differ from the one passed by the house two years ago and shelved in senate last July. The original cash bonus option was eliminated and the bank loan provision of the adjusted service certificate title substituted.

Uncle Joe Speaks
Like the house itself, the galleries were pro-bonus and supporters of the bill were frequently applauded despite the infirming of the rules which this entailed. But the greatest applause was not for a proponent, the members and many of the spectators rising and tendering an ovation to "Uncle Joe" Cannon, as the grizzled holder of the American record for length of legislative service arose late in the day to deliver a two-minute speech in which he declared that the men who served in the World War owed that service to their country.

75 Orations.
In all there was slightly more than five hours of discussion with 75 of the 415 members taking part in it. Transcripts of their remarks would fill about two ordinary sized newspapers. Many of them were on their feet only a minute or two, but the house gave unanimous consent for all members to extend their remarks in the Congressional Record during the next few days and editions of that volume during that time promise to be exceedingly bulky.

Arguments against the bill were more frequent than those in its favor, due to the fact that many democrats who announced they would support it vigorously attacked some of its provisions and the ways and means committee for failure to provide means of financing the bonus. In the course of the debate the measure was referred to as a "gold brick," a "bogus bill," a "hookus pokus" and a "deformed and malformed creature."

GROCERY FIRM QUILTS TONIGHT

Oregon Grocery Company Will Discontinue At Close of Business Today.

Announcement was made this morning by C. D. Emahizer of the Oregon Grocery Company that the firm would pass out of existence with the close of business this evening. The local firm was the representative in this section of Lang & Co., and is being discontinued because, in spite of the large amount of trade in this section of the state, the business at this time is not as profitable as desired.

The firm was formed on March 7, 1912, and built up a large business. It was capitalized at \$100,000 and Mr. Emahizer has been in charge of the affairs of the company since its opening. "The tendency throughout the country is for the large wholesale houses to discontinue their smaller branches and operate directly from their main house," he said today.

Mr. Emahizer declared that he will remain here a month or so winding up the affairs of the concern and then expects to re-establish himself in the grocery business here.

HURON LONG A RESIDENT HERE

Newly Nominated Postmaster of La Grande Stood Second in Examination.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 24.—The President Thursday nominated Ralph R. Huron postmaster at La Grande, Oregon, and James E. Whitehead in a similar position at Turner. Huron is a former lieutenant who served in France and was highly commended by his superiors. He stood second on the eligible list reported by the civil service commission. Edward E. Bragg, present postmaster and a Democrat, was first, and Clifford K. McCormick, third.

Ralph R. Huron was born in Valley Falls, Jefferson County, Kansas, in 1878 and was raised in Indiana, where he spent the greater share of his life. He came to the Grande Ronde valley in 1907 and since then has made his home in the valley, having been affiliated with the following lumbering concerns and having been very successful in his business affairs: The Summerville Lumber Co., the Wenaha Lumber Co., the George Palmer Lumber Co. and the Canyon Lumber Co. He sold out his interests in this last concern about a year ago. He now makes his home in La Grande.

Mr. Huron has a college education. He is well liked and possesses a pleasant personality.

During the trouble in the Philippines in 1899 and 1901 Mr. Huron served as a private, and in the World War he served for two and one-half years under the stars and stripes. When he was mustered out he was a first lieutenant in the quartermaster corps and saw one and one-half years of service in the eastern part of France.

Mr. Huron is overwhelmed by the many congratulations tendered him by his friends and well wishers who promptly hunted him up to shake hands with him as soon as they were aware of the nomination.

E. E. Bragg, postmaster here for the past eight years and three months, has ranked high among the postmasters in this section of the state.

Mr. Bragg feels that in Mr. Huron La Grande will have a postmaster who will do his utmost to keep the standard of service as high as possible and who will attend to his duties in a meritorious manner.

NORTHCLIFFE IS SURPRISED

JERUSALEM, Mar. 24.—Lord Northcliffe, British newspaper publisher, expressed surprise on his visit here that it was deemed necessary to meet him and escort him through the streets with armored cars. He said it was a source of wonder to him how little the people in England and America knew about the conditions existing in the Holy Land.

Voicing regret that he found Palestine so unhappy, he asserted that the British public "was imperfectly informed regarding the feeling in Palestine" and he added that he hoped Palestinians would not move too quickly and make Palestine "another Ireland."

Lord Northcliffe was given an opportunity to hear two sides of the Zionist question. A delegation of Orthodox Jews which waited on him protested against Zionism. Later a delegation of Zionists called and requested an expression from him on the Balfour declaration of Great Britain's intention to make this a Jewish homeland. To this latter delegation, the British publisher said:

"No one wishes the Jews to return to the Holy Land more than I do but I have the greatest regret of the need of armored cars. You exaggerate the idea that the only topic we have in England is Zion. Everyone does not agree as yet on the interpretation of the Balfour declaration."

He reminded the Zionists that Orthodox Jewry did not concur in the political aims of Zionism as indicated by the delegation from that faction which had previously called upon him. Concluding, Lord Northcliffe expressed the hope that Arabs and Jews would be more reasonable in their demands upon England and work together for the good of Palestine.
