"BITS OF LIFE" PROVES NOVELTY HIT ON SCREEN

"Bits of Life," the Marshall Neilan production, which opened an engagement at the Arcade Theatre yesterday, sets a new milestone of progress in the silent dramatic art. It is likewise a triumph in acting as well as conception and direction.

The outstanding merit, however, lies in the new idea which Marshall Neilan has injected into motion picture-making. Lon Chaney gives a magnificent characterization as a Chinaman in the episode based on "Hop." It is indeed one of his finest contributions to the screen.

AT SHERRY'S LAST DAY.

Not since John Drew was in his prime on the legitimate stage has the theatre seen a light comedy performance given with a suavity and finesse that distinguished Bert Lytell's screen appearance last night at the Sherry Theatre in "The Man Who," an adaptation by Arthur Zeller of Lloyd Osborne's Saturday Evening Post story. As Reddy Mills, the man who tries to break the shoe trust by starting a barefoot movement in the social world, Mr. Lytell was a source of constant joy to the discriminating. He obtained his effects with economy of method and a subtly artistic restraint, but the effects stirred the risibilities of the audience, which greeted the production with gurgling enthusiasm. Mr. Lytell made of Reddy a lovable human being, poignant in his moments of tenderness.

"The Man Who" is a Maxwell Karger production for Metro, and never has Mr. Karger directed a performance that was more finely done down to the smallest detail. Such well-known stars as Luvy Cotton and Virginia Valli appeared in Mr. Lytell's support, Miss Cotton ravishingly beautiful as the New York aristocrat for whom Reddy tries to become a Max. Who, and Miss Valli adorable as the shoe magnate's daughter. Others in the cast were: Frank Currier, Tammany Young, Fred Warren, Clarence J. Elmer, William Roselle, Mary Louise Benton and Frank Strayer. The photoplay is by Arthur Martinelli and the art interiors by M. P. Stauley.

VIENNA GIRLS FOOLED BY ADS

(By Associated Press)

VIENNA, Mar. 23.—Vienna girls are being warned not to be misled by marriage advertisements from America. Half dozen alleged cases of deception that are cited by Der Morgen which asserts they are "but a few out of hundreds" in which Austrian women have gone to America to marry.

One case described is that of a daughter of a "high official" who answered an advertisement in a Vienna paper stating that an engineer in Chicago desired to wed a pretty educated Viennese. In German the word engineer always means a professional title and is never applied to mechanics.

When she arrived she found the man was a metal worker. He soon lost his job and the girl's parents had to sacrifice even their household goods to send her money to return.

Another instance is related in which the advertisement contained the phrase "An American (dark) wishes to marry, etc." The prospective groom was a negro.

Usually, says the paper, the advertisements describe the man as earning so many million crowns a month, which the woman finds to mean virtually nothing in American standards.
