## DR. CORPE'S DEATH A SHOCK

The following account of the death of Dr. S. L. Corpe, formerly of Cove, appeared in a recent issue of the El Monte, California, Gazette:

The entire El Monte community was saddened when the news of the death of Dr. S. L. Corpe became known.

Dr. Corpe left home about 9 o'clock Monday morning to make his professional calls in and near San Gabriel. He was in his sedan, and was struck by a Pacific Electric limited train at a new crossing in Walnut Acres—Amorilla street. The car was completely demolished, and those who saw the accident say the doctor was undoubtedly instantly killed.

Dr. Corpe was born in Goshen, Indiana, March 24th, 1866. With

his parents he crossed the plains to Eastern Oregon when he was 12 years of age. The family settled in Cove, Oregon, and it was here the doctor received his elementary education. After earning his way through the Willamette University in Portland by teaching school, he was married June 31st, 1890, to Anna E. Thornton, who survives him.

In 1893-94 Dr. Corpe attended the Hahnemann Medical College in Chicago, graduating in the latter year. He then returned to Oregon and practiced until 1909, when he came to California. He resided and reviewed his medical work for nearly two years at Santa Barbara, and then with his family settled in El Monte in the spring of 1911.

With the exception of serving in the Los Angeles County hospital a year and a half during the war, and a vacation trip by automobile through the east, he has been in El Monte since that time.

Dr. Corpe was respected and loved by all who knew him—and he loved and respected all of his acquaintances. His philosophy of life was to help others and to make those whom he came in contact happy. His death was a real shock to his hundreds of friends, and is a real loss to the El Monte community.

Besides his widow, he is survived by a daughter, Alice, age 13, two sons, G. S. and T. L. Corpe, a brother George, all of El Monte; a sister, Alice Allen, and a brother, Fred, of Cove, Oregon.

K. K. K. THREATENS

## MOTHER LODE TO BE SOUGHT

MALHEUR CITY, Mar. 24.—The coming summer will see renewed activity in the famed mining districts in northern Malheur county, according to George H. Bodish. The Rainbow, the Golden Eagle and the Hope mines will all be worked on more or less large scales, in addition to the many prospectors and smaller mining activities which will be in evidence. The district around Malheur City will take on new life, Mr. Bodish predicts, and business conditions will be better.

The Malheur county mines have been dormant for many years as far as extensive placer operations are concerned. There has been desultory mining by small groups and individual prospectors but nothing to compare with the days which made the district famous.

Malheur City is the old "New Eldorado" of the early sixties. It is the center of some of the richest placer mines ever developed in the west. Millions were taken in gold from these fields.

There are old-time miners in Malheur county who believe that the Malheur county mines will "come back" some of these days and for a second time ascend to the hall of fame in the mining world. They call attention to the geographical shape of the placer fields in this district, which are along three sides of a triangle. Somewhere within this triangle lies the buried river mountain which they believe lies hidden the mother lode from which this placer gold was washed at one time. Old prospectors have never given up this idea and are continually searching for this virgin deposit of the precious metal.

## THEOSOPHIST AROUSES FUROR

(By Associated Press.) STOCKHOLM, Mar. 24.—No person in private or public life who has visited Sweden of late years has aroused a journalistic furor as Mrs. Katherine Tingley, head of the Universal Brotherhood and Theosophical society of Point Loma, Cal., who has now been here for several weeks. She has been the target of attack in the Stockholm press and Swedish ministers have joined in protesting against her influence in Sweden.

Thus far the storm of criticism has had apparently no effect on the American woman unless it has induced her to prolong her visit. A few days ago she left the Grand Hotel, Stockholm's principal hotel and moved into an apartment in the fashionable Strandvaegen, an avenue where many socially prominent residents of the capital have their homes.

The Swedish newspapers say Mrs. Tingley came to Sweden because of fear that her Swedish sect was about to fall to pieces. The newspaper Dagbladet Nyheter adds that two to Mrs. Tingley's high executives in Sweden have recently resigned their posts. One of these was Captain von Greyer, head of the Stockholm branch of theosophists and the other was Torsten Karlsson, leader of the Gothenburg Theosophical sect.

Nya Dagbladet Aftonbladet and other newspapers state that Dr. Erik Bohren of Helsingborg has been chosen head of the Universal Brotherhood of Theosophical Society of Sweden. E. A. Gyllenberg, treasurer and Mrs. Anna Wicander, a well known Stockholm society woman, head of the Stockholm circle. If Mrs. Tingley came here to reorganize her sect she has apparently finished her task.

One reason for Mrs. Tingley's visit here was understood to be to erect a Rajya Yoga school on the beautiful island of Vindigö in Lake Vattern, Central Sweden. But her friends say she has decided not to do this at present. Before the war Swedish theosophists raised about \$25,000 for that purpose.

The land was owned 200 years ago by Count Per Brahe, one of Sweden's most famous nobles. Stockholm newspapers say that Mrs. Tingley has asserted that she is a reincarnation of the Count and that on visiting the island some years ago she exclaimed dramatically: "Ah, my old home!" One effect of the newspaper campaign has been to pack the lecture halls where Mrs. Tingley has been speaking.

## COMMISSION CLASH DENIED

(By Associated Press.) BULGARIA, Mar. 24.—A conflict has occurred between the Commission of Reparations in Sofia and the Bulgarian government. The government ordered the prefects to inform the people that the Allies had agreed to a postponement of the payment of reparations.

The Committee of the Reparations Commission promptly issued an official communique denying the report. The Bulgarian censorship prevented the publication of the Reparations Commission's denial in the newspapers.

## FOOD SUPPLY IS IMPROVING

(By Associated Press.) LONDON, Mar. 24.—Owing to the steadily improving food conditions in Hungary, the American Relief Administration has closed its offices.

Stocks sufficient to carry the relief work up to next June have been left for distribution by the local committee, whose president, Professor James Bokay, has sent the following cable to Herbert Hoover, chairman of the American Relief Administration: "Permit me to convey on behalf of this suffering nation its undying gratitude for the noble humanitarian work which America under your esteemed leadership has extended to us in our hour of need. May you be given strength for continuation of your great world leadership."

Since August, 1921, when the American Relief Administration started operating in Hungary, 42,000,000 meals have been served and the total value of food and clothing distributed amounts to \$1,205,639.

## EXPLOITATION IS CHARGED

(By Associated Press.) CONSTANTINOPLE, Mar. 24.—Newspaper organs of the Nationalist government at Ankara assert that some Americans are among the capitalist groups who have approached the government of Kemal Pasha to obtain concessions in Anatolia to exploit mines and forests, to obtain raw materials, introduce agricultural machinery and establish clothing and shoe factories.

The minister of public works of the Ankara government has informed newspapers there that American capitalists have proposed to construct two railway lines, one from Samasun to the Persian frontier, passing Erivan and Van and the other extending from Mossul to Diyarbakir. These offers, he said, had been accepted by the ministry but not finally authorized.

Some of the mining concessions now sought by the American capitalists were granted by the Sublime Porte to nationals of France and Great Britain but the government of Kemal Pasha had annulled them. Agents of European governments were anxiously watching the expansion of American influence in Anatolia which they consider a serious menace to their interests.

## BETTER SHIP SERVICE PLAN

PAPEETE, Tahiti, Mar. 24.—Shippers of island produce in Tahiti have long been dissatisfied with the excessive freight rates charged by the only steamship line serving the island and efforts have been made to find other carriers. One trading concern has negotiated with the Canadian government line to have one of their steamers call at Tahiti at regular intervals. The coming of the first steamer under that contract produced a fall in freight rates on copra to San Francisco of five dollars a ton.

In addition to the above, a number of American capitalists are preparing to institute a direct steamship service from San Francisco to Tahiti on the lines of the old Oceanic Steamship service of some years ago, an oil-burning freight and passenger steamer sailing to the islands every 36 days, calling in at the Marquesas Islands en route.

## GHOST HUNTER WON'T TALK

Another ghost of Antigone, the descendant of which is now in the news, is told by Dr. M. J. E. Tetraault, of Porterville, who is following the reports with interest.

Back in 1886, Dr. Tetraault went to Antigone to help establish small cheese factories. While walking near a mill pond one day he came across boys spearing fish, then against the law. To frighten the boys away he decided to spin flat stones close to them, making a loud humming noise and clattering against tin on a barn.

Frightened, the boys ran into town and told of a ghost having appeared to them, throwing rocks as big as cannon balls. Naturally, Dr. Tetraault never explained, but for days thereafter this "ghost" was the talk of the town.
