REAL "PRINCE OF DENMARK"

Hamlet Not Altogether a Creation of the Brain of the Greatest of English Writers.

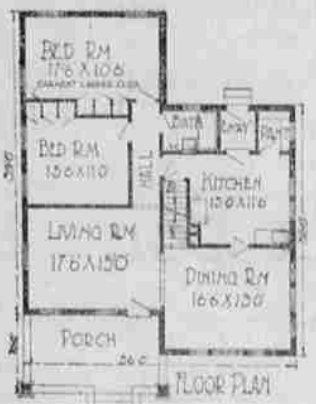
Hamlet, the hero of Shakespeare's most famous tragedy, is a personage who appears in history, yet is half mythological, but has been transformed by the genius of the English poet into one of the most dominating figures of literature. It is alleged that Shakespeare's Hamlet was suggested by the Hamlet, or Amleth, of Saxo Grammaticus. The latter's "History of Denmark" had been published in Paris in 1514. Francois de Belleforest included the tale of Hamlet in his "Tragic Histories" (1570), an English translation of which appeared in 1598. Shakespeare's drama was written earlier than this last date and must have derived its plot either from the Belleforest's work or a translation; executed before the end of the sixteenth century, unless the poet, who, it is known, was a great reader of histories, took the incident direct from Saxo Grammaticus.

the present. With thousands marrying each year, the number of new homes being erected to house them is sadly inadequate. It is estimated there are a million homes short in the United States. That is why every family should seriously consider the possibility of getting a home of its own. For the family of moderate means the bungalow affords an excellent shelter. It is small, comparatively inexpensive, and delightfully cozy and comfortable. Moreover it is distinctively individual in design.

Such a home is the charming bungalow shown here with floor plans. Low rambling design, it forms a very pleasing picture with its lustrous white stucco exterior and seclusion front porch recessed under an extension of the roof. It gives an impression of hominess, but really is not as large as it looks at a glance, as the dimensions show. This bungalow house is 30 feet wide and 30 feet long; on the longer side which includes the wing containing the rear bedroom.



The windows are unique and simple, insuring plenty of light and ventilation in all parts of the house. Two triple windows provide light for the dining room, a large cheerful room on the right front. 10 feet 6 inches by 13 feet. The porch is a few steps above the walk and very attractively surrounded by broad stucco balustrades and provided for all kinds of the same material. The front door opens directly into the living room, the largest room in the house, being 17 feet 6 inches by 15 feet. The living and dining rooms are connected by a wide open doorway. Leading from the living room is a narrow hall which gives access to the two bedrooms and equipped with space-saving entrance carriers which eliminate much of the waste entailed by old-fashioned clothes closets. ANTI-FAG WEEK IS DESIGNATED

Anti-Cigarette League Will Celebrate Opposition to "Coffin Nails" Week Beginning April 23.

CHICAGO, March 25.—The week beginning April 23 has been designated as "national Anti-Cigarette Week" by the National Anti-Cigarette League, according to an announcement made today by Miss Lucy Page Gaston, superintendent of the league.

The announcement says that the reason for selecting this particular week is because yesterday was officially designated as Anti-Cigarette Day by the International Sunday School Association.

In her announcement today, Miss Gaston says:

"We cannot hope that prohibition of liquor will be a success until the cigarette is eliminated, because cigarette smoking creates a craving which only alcohol can satisfy. Home brew and cigarettes are twin evils, neither of which is likely to be abolished successfully while the other remains with us."

"The National Anti-Cigarette League stands for the complete extermination of the cigarette through education, law enforcement and prohibition legislation, but we are not seeking to prohibit the sale or use of tobacco in other forms except to and by minors."

"The astounding increase in cigarette smoking by women and girls is cause for genuine alarm owing to the fact that this habit strikes directly at the fountain of life thereby imperiling the virility and strength of future generations."

"The immeasurable harm which the cigarette is causing to youth of America is now widely recognized by parents, teachers and others interested in the welfare of the rising generation. The community organization plan of our 'Clean Life Movement' is proving to be just what is needed, not only to combat the cigarette but other evils that menace the health and morals of the youth of every community."

LONG DRIVING CHAMPIONSHIP

LONDON, Mar. 25.—A long driving championship, open to amateur and professional golfers, will be held at Sandwich on June 17, the Saturday before the British Open Championship, according to present arrangements.

Competitors will be required to drive three shots with balls conforming to the specifications from time to time laid down by the Rules of Golf Committee and purchasable in the open market; and three shots with balls of their own choice, one in each class to count. The winner will be the player who covers the greatest aggregate distance by carry and run combined with his two counting shots. No ball pitching outside set limits will be allowed to count.

The object of the competition is to provide exact information to the golfing public and to the Rules of Golf and Championship Committees, the architects of golf courses and the green committees of golf club.

A special challenge cup has been offered for the event. The winner, if an amateur, will receive a replica of the cup. If a professional wins, a cash prize will be awarded.

SUNDAY OFFERING ACHIEVEMENT

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Mar. 25.—The Sunday offering of the East Tenth Street Methodist church here was swelled from its usual amount of about \$175 to nearly \$800 the first week that the new system was adopted, says Bishop F. D. Leete. Since then, according to the bishop, the church has made financial strides indicated by an increase of \$300 in the salary of its pastor, Rev. George S. 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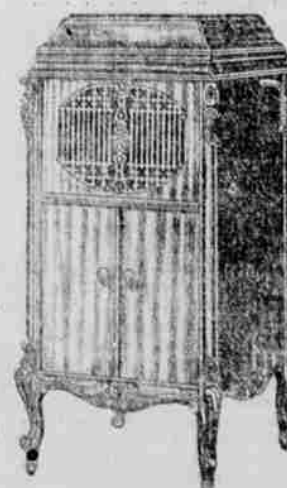
