EUGENE TABOOS GAMING DIVES

District Attorney Orders
Clean-up of Pool Halls
and Card Rooms.

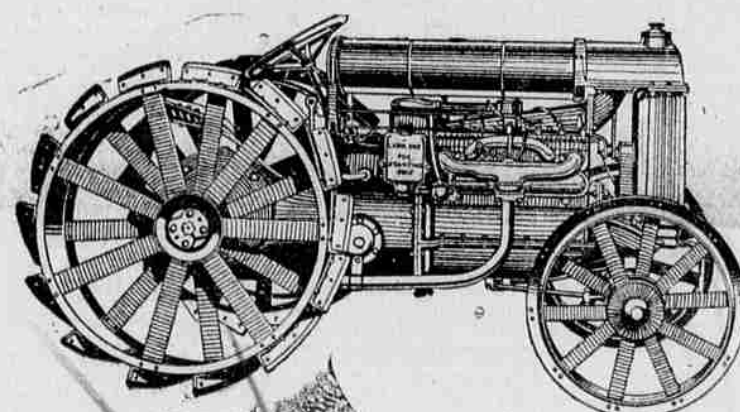
EUGENE, Mar. 25. — No more gaming is to be permitted in Eugene card rooms or pool halls, according to the statement of District Attorney Clyde N. Johnston given to pool and card room proprietors at a meeting held yesterday in his office. Playing for chips will still

be permitted, however, it was made plain by Attorney Johnston that all forms of gambling must be stopped at once, or the pool and card rooms will be closed.

Many complaints have come in, according to Attorney Johnston, from university authorities and parents claiming that many young men have lost heavily at cards and "pea-pool" played at the local card and pool rooms.

The proprietors showed a willingness to cooperate in this matter, and are to hold a meeting this afternoon to perfect an organization to suppress all forms of gambling in their establishments. The rule in regard to card and pool games will remain unchanged as long as the proprietors abide by it and permit does not lie there, but it is no poetical no money to change hands, nor ex- change any money for chips, stated Attorney Johnston.
