TWO THOUSAND OUT OF WORK

Legion Shows That Many Former Service Men In Portland Are Seeking Employment.

PORTLAND, Mar. 28.—A report on unemployment conditions in Oregon sent to Lemuel Bolles, National Adjutant of The American Legion by Harry S. Nelson, Adjutant of the Oregon department, disclosed the fact that there are 2100 men registered with the Legion employment bureau in Portland, 900 of them badly in need of work and practically half of those registered either married or have dependents. It is a crying shame, reads Adjutant Nelson's report, that some two thousand veterans of the World war are out of employment in the city of Portland alone.

Herculean efforts are being made by the American Legion with the opening of its nation-wide drive to provide "short time" and permanent jobs for its buddies. Local posts all over Oregon are cooperating with civic and fraternal organizations, business men and others to provide employment for the World war veterans.

Local posts learning of positions open in the communities are urgently asked to communicate with state headquarters of the Legion, in order that many men registered with the Legion employment bureau, can be sent out of town on positions.

Posts have been asked to make a survey of the unemployed in their district; cooperate with the local civic organizations; devise ways and means for finding employment for those who have no trade; get the cooperation of the labor unions; county officials and other public officials and bend every ounce of energy to help their more unfortunate comrades.

Appeals have been sent to employers throughout the state to take on additional help, and cities have been asked to inaugurate clean-up and paint-up campaigns.

DISPUTE IS TO END SOON NOW

GENEVA, Mar. 28.—The Swiss government, which was asked to arbitrate long standing boundary dispute between Colombia and Venezuela, is expected soon to announce its decision.

Dr. C. Lardy, former Swiss Minister at Paris, has made an exhaustive study into the merits of the case and has transmitted his findings and recommendations to the Political Department of the government.

It is not possible to forecast the nature of the report but both Colombia and Venezuela have notified the Swiss government that its decision will be accepted as final, no matter which side is favored.

CABARETS NOT WANTED THERE

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 28.—The capital of Mexico is no place for an American cabaret. Restaurants from the United States who have risked their money in such ventures here have found that they are not popular and within the next few months, a number of professional entertainers from the United States have returned to the home as best they could after finding that there are no opportunities for their special line of work.

Mexican cafe frequenters have equal American jazz acceptable but efforts to popularize professional dancers and singers have met with no success.
