ACTRESS HAS MADE REPORT

WASHINGTON, Mar. 29.—Miss Lillian Russell, famous actress, sent abroad as special immigration commissioner, reports to Washington that in her judgment two drastic changes should be made in immigration laws. The first would prohibit all immigration for five years, the second would provide that all immigrants coming to the country live here for twenty-one years before being permitted to vote.

"Our own males must live here for that length of time before being given the ballot, why not aliens?" Miss Russell argues.

Miss Russell believes that no immigrant should be permitted to remain here who will not within a given length of time, learn to read and write English; and that immigration officials should come over on all boats bringing immigrants, talking with those who will make their homes here, learning their ambitions, and thus being able to direct them where they should go in America for their own and the country's best good.

Speaking of her belief in the need to restrict immigration for five years, Miss Russell said:

"Europe is ready to release thousands of immigrants, most of them undesirable, the moment our restrictions are lifted. It is for us to stem such a destructive tide by legislation which will admit to residence here only constructive labor. We need farm workers, not lower East Side denizens, which are the sort most eager to enter here."

MOTOR SLED FOR WINTER

(By Associated Press)

WARROAD, Minn., Mar. 29.—When snowstorms of last winter tied up railroad traffic completely, a sled equipped with 125 horsepower aviation motor and with runners, nine feet long and six feet wide patterned after skis, carried passengers from town to town. The sled has been used daily through the winter to carry passengers and freight 50 miles on the Lake of the Woods. The trip requires four hours, according to the owners of the sled, who say it enables people across the lake, who formerly spent three days in reaching Warroad, to make the trip in two hours.

There is extensive winter fishing on the lake, most of it done 50 miles from here. It was formerly difficult to haul fresh fish to shipping facilities by team without its spilling or freezing, but the sled has remedied that condition.

The sled also serves for lively work over roads impassable for teams.

Mrs. Webster Laid To Rest On Monday

The funeral of Mrs. Arthur Webster was held here Monday afternoon from the Christian church. Marie Alice Vehr was born January 24, 1880, and on September 14, 1905 was married to Arthur Webster, passing away March 26, 1922. She is survived by one son, Spencer, aged 15.

Her father, Herman Vehr, also survives. Five brothers and two sisters surviving her are John, Will, George, Otto, Ernest and Anna Vehr and Helen McReynolds.

WHISKEY IS SMUGGLED OUT

BUFFALO, Mar. 29.—The entire output of an Ontario distillery has been smuggled across the border and has found ready market here at prices ranging from \$85 to \$125 a case of 12 bottles, evidence in the hands of the customs and prohibition enforcement officers indicates. The evidence will be placed before a federal grand jury and is expected to result in a number of indictments.
