NEGATIVES TO BE SAFEGUARDED

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Mar. 30.—Measures to safeguard the interests of the natives of the former German New Guinea territory are being prepared by Australia, which has a mandate over the region, it was announced today.

Great difficulty will be experienced, it is anticipated in the government's efforts, because the tribes differ in character, language and intellectual development.

One of the measures calls for the establishment of an industrial school for boys between 9 and 12 years of age. Their time will be divided between ordinary school pursuits and shop work, including elementary carpentry, plumbing and painting. School subjects will include English, reading and writing and the "value of cleanliness," according to announcement. It is believed that this school may

become self-supporting within a few years.

Experts also have advised that the especially apt pupils be trained more extensively in order that they may become assistant teachers. The original school, in the manner of an experiment, will be continued for three years. If it proves successful, institutions will be opened in other districts.

DISEASE CAUSE OF ANIMAL LOSS

Three-Fourths of Ailments Which Ruin Valuable Herds Can Be Prevented.

STRICT SANITATION NEEDED

Contagious Maladies, Sporadic Ailments, Parasitic Troubles, Accidents and Neglect Are All Quite Disastrous.

Every year the people of the United States lose over \$200,000,000 directly (and no one knows how much indirectly) through diseases of farm animals. This is a large toll when divided on a per capita basis, and when it comes home to the farm stock-raiser who finds a valuable animal dead in the barn, or an epidemic spreading in his herd, the loss is sometimes disastrous. The most regrettable feature of the case is that probably three-fourths of the loss could be prevented.

Five Causes of Disease

There are five principal causes of disease and death of farm animals—contagious diseases, sporadic disease, parasitic troubles, accidents and neglect. Contagious diseases can be avoided, or at least their consequences greatly diminished, if farmers will learn to co-operate with the United States Department of Agriculture and the various state livestock and sanitary authorities, who are striving to maintain animal health. Farmers should report promptly to the nearest officials any suspicion of the presence of contagious disease, and they should observe carefully all regulations in regard to quarantine, sanitation, and care of animals, as protection against contagion.

Tuberculosis is one of the worst scourges among animals and it thrives best in damp, dark, ill-ventilated stables. It is less common among animals running at large. Light, dry, well-ventilated stables and dry, clean barnyards or paddocks are essential to the health of farm animals. One valuable point in combating contagious diseases, especially tuberculosis, is to start the herd with animals that not only are free from disease, but are of

stock that is not predisposed to disease. Official tests of herds are made on request and through co-operation of the United States Department of Agriculture with livestock sanitary officials. Purchase of breeding stock from these herds is a wise precaution. Care also should be taken to obtain stock adapted to climate and local conditions. The other sources of animal loss are largely a matter of intelligent and careful handling.

Sporadic and incidental diseases, such as disorders of the digestive and respiratory tracts, can be avoided largely by proper handling and feeding. A proper balancing of rations has a material influence on the health of live stock. Too much of any food element is likely to result in digestive disorders, thus predisposing the animal to disease.

Parasitic diseases also carry off large numbers of valuable animals every year. They are largely the result of improper housing and neglect. The average farmer can not be expected to have the time and aptitude for study which will keep him abreast with the latest developments in feeds and feeding, animal nutrition and medicine, hygiene, and other important matters related to the stock-raising industry. He can, however, avail himself of the benefit of the studies and demonstrations of specialists who have devoted their entire time to these subjects. Every state agricultural college maintains a corps of specialists whose publications and services are available.

Department Offers Aid

The department of agriculture is constantly giving out important information in books and bulletins which may be had on request and in every state the department has representatives three combating animal diseases. It is well to consult a local veterinarian in case of any disturbing symptoms and to report to the state veterinarian or the United States Department of Agriculture any symptoms which indicate the possibility of an epidemic. WORLD'S RECORD IS ENDANGERED

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., Mar. 30.—Glenn Hartranft, husky Stanford sophomore, who has been throwing the 16-pound shot farther than it has been thrown in ten years, hopes this year or next to put the big iron ball out far enough to smash the present world's record.

At present the world mark for this event is 51 feet and was set by the late Ralph Rose. Hartranft early this season was putting the shot 50 feet and three quarters of an inch. Coach "Dink" Templeton of the Stanford track team is certain that the big fellow will yet break the record.

Hartranft does other things on the Stanford farm besides putting the shot. He is a fast man in the 100 yard dash and put the discus out 144 feet. In football he went in last year as a substitute guard.

Hartranft registers from Fullerton, Calif. Last year, when he was a freshman, little was heard of him for he was not eligible to compete for the Cardinal.

RECREATION IS URGED FOR LIFE

EUGENE, Mar. 30.—A serious attempt is being made by the school of physical education at the University of Oregon here to impart to every male student in college an interest in some sort of recreation in his freshman and sophomore years to carry through life.

"It is the man with no ability in athletics and no interest in sport that our department is interested in," declares Dean John F. Boydard.

"The men who can make the variety teams can take care of themselves," he adds. A sport schedule, as well as a study schedule for every man is the aim of the department.

SOUTH SEAS TOUR ARRANGED

PASADENA, Calif., Mar. 30.—Keith Spalding, noted sportsman, will conduct a schooner-yacht this year in which he will make an extended tour of the South Seas in 1923, he announced here recently.

Mr. Spalding has commissioned a New York naval architect to design the craft, which, according to present plans, will have a length over all of 162 feet and a cruising radius of 4025 miles at full speed.

The sportsman will act as his own skipper on the proposed jaunt, while his wife will serve in the capacity of mate.

MADAME LIANG ENTERTAINS

PEKING, Mar. 30.—During the absence of Premier Liang Shih-yi on sick leave caused by sudden change in the Chinese political situation, foreign diplomats have been entertained by Madame Liang; this being the first time in China that a woman has presided over an official social function. The annual spring dinner parties given in honor of the diplomatic corps were held with Madame Liang acting as hostess and as the representative of her husband. She was assisted by her daughter.
