No longer will tourists carry the news from one to another until it reaches New York and Boston that the road west of La Grande is a spring breaker, a liver dislocator and a place where church men lose their religion. They will no longer advise the Central Oregon route to tourists making for the west, for no one wants to take a Central Oregon route when they can go this way on a good road and make all the good towns of Eastern Oregon.

## LET FADS AND FRILLS GO IS SUGGESTION

Arbor Day should also be observed, in the opinion of the state board, and the day should be set aside as a period for the beautification of the school grounds. This year several thousand two-year-old rose bushes will be sent out to schools applying for them before April 14th. About 1500 of these bushes are available for Eastern Oregon.

Several other announcements of interest to the principals and superintendents present were made by Supt. Churchill in concluding his address. The afternoon meeting opened at 1:30 o'clock. Supt. H. M. DuBois, of Enterprise, president of the Oregon Inter-scholastic Athletic Association, explained the new athletic rules. This was followed by a discussion by Prin. Roy Conklin, of Union, and Prin. Gene Hall of Haines. Supt. J. A. Churchill substantiated Supt. DuBois' remarks.

Preliminary to the close of the meeting, the committee on resolutions presented the following resolutions, which were unanimously accepted:  
 FIRST, we recommend the continuance of these meetings of superintendents and principals of Eastern Oregon, on account of the benefit derived from them by those in attendance through discussion of problems of peculiar interest to teachers of this section.  
 SECOND, we favor consolidation of school districts into larger administrative units with a view to increasing the efficiency of the schools at lower cost to the taxpayers.  
 THIRD, we favor the county unit plan of organization of schools as passed by a recent session of the Oregon legislature, providing for uniformity of taxation and more efficient supervision.

FOURTH, we desire to express our appreciation of the work of Superintendent J. A. Churchill during his administration on account of the high minded manner in which he has conducted the office and the great advancement of education throughout the state, and we highly endorse his candidacy for re-election.  
 FIFTH, we oppose any reduction of teachers' salaries because it would drive from the profession many of our best teachers and greatly decrease the efficiency of the schools.  
 SIXTH, we believe that many of the special subjects are among the most important in our course of study and oppose their elimination therefrom except in case of absolute necessity.

SEVENTH, we appreciate the courtesy that has been extended to this association by the school board and administrative officers of the La Grande district in the use of the building and equipment of the high school, and we hereby extend to them our thanks for these favors.  
 EIGHTH, we further express our appreciation to Superintendent J. A. Churchill, to the officers of this association and to all those who have contributed to the success of this meeting.
