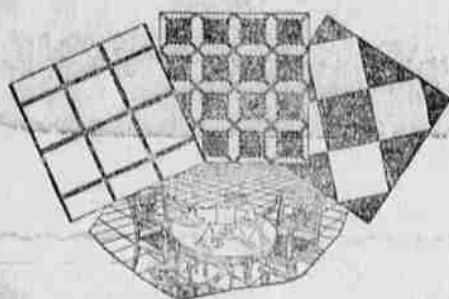
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charge of the funeral. Mr. Connolly went to Arizona some time ago on account of his health and there contracted the flu. The widow and children will accompany the body to Oregon.

READY FOR THE TRACTOR SCHOOL

All Participants Have Arrived in the City; First Session at Roesch Garage This Evening.

The participants in the three-day Tractor and Power Farming School, which is to operate in La Grande beginning tonight and continuing until Wednesday night, arrived in the city this morning.

The school is a joint production of the Ford Motor company, the Standard Oil company, the Oliver Chilled Plow company, O. A. C. and the American Seeding Machine company. All these manufacture power plants, or machines or implements, or the human intelligence to install and direct the machines in the field.

In part, the demonstration consists of daily addresses and questionnaires conducted by each of the representatives. The sessions are held each evening at 7:30. Charles Harrison, for the Oliver Plow company, tells more things about plows and plowing than most men ever dreamed there could be in the subject.

Professor W. G. Gilmore, of O. A. C., urges the farmers to make more use of the three branches of their service—the extension bureau, the resident instruction and the experimental division where they aim to try everything that promises to be of benefit to the Oregon farmer. He says that the college used to send out its bulletins to a blanket list of more than 34,000 people, but lately this list has been curtailed, and the bulletins go to the discriminating inquirers who ask special lines of investigation.

Fred Serviss of the American Seeding Machine company, presents the power seeder in a wonderfully roscate light. Mr. Serviss states the interesting fact that "Row-crops" are coming to be more and more the standard in Oregon, and that every farmer needs to investigate the two row cultivator as the one best solution for keeping his land clean and for cultivating for summer moisture conservation so as to produce the largest crops.

William Munro tells all about proper lubrication for all farm machinery. It doesn't sound like a romance, but the story of proper oiling is really a thrilling narrative.
