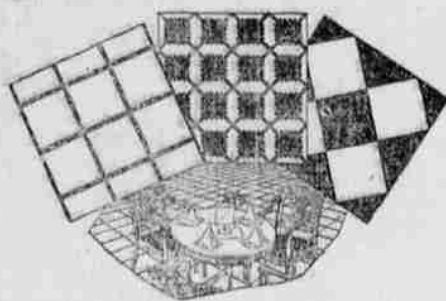
SEVEN ENROLL

"Our work in printing the Bible will be immensely simplified," Doctor Burkwall said, "by the recent adoption of a standardized Chinese language. Scholars have reduced the Chinese printed alphabet to thirty-nine printed characters, and this standardized language is becoming more and more generally used. Formerly the Chinese language contained fifty thousand written symbols."

OLD DOORWAY
IS REOPENED

LONDON, Apr. 4.—After having been closed for 187 years, a blocked-up doorway at Hampton Court Palace has been re-opened.

It connects Henry VIII's so-called Watching Chamber and the well-known Haunted Gallery. Through it have passed Shakespeare, Charles I, Queen Elizabeth, Mary Queen of Scots, Oliver Cromwell and a host of other historical personages. Catherine Howard, one of Henry VIII's consorts passed through it on her way to the scaffold. Shakespeare's company performed plays in the Great Hall of Hampton Court Palace at Christmas, 1608, and the rehearsals took place in the Watching Chamber.

A feature of the "Haunted Gallery" was a picture of the "Wild Man and Woman," brought by Martin Probiehner from America, which is supposed to have given Shakespeare his first conception of Caliban.

The doorway was closed by King George II in 1735, who had the gallery turned into a habitable room.

HISTORIC FORT
TO BE REBUILT

D. A. R. Is Making Preparations
for Preserving Fort
Crawford in Wisconsin.

(By Associated Press)
PRAIRIE DU CHIEN, Wis., Apr. 3.—Preservation and eventual reconstruction of historic Fort Crawford, is forecast by the action of the Prairie du Chien chapter of the D. A. R. in securing an option on the property from W. H. Graves, its owner, in an effort to preserve it for historical purposes.

Fort Crawford was the most famous of any of the forts in the Northwest. The original post, Fort Shelby, was built during the war of 1812. Hardly had the first American troops taken possession of it, when a detachment of British troops, reinforced by Indians, came down the Wisconsin river and laid siege to it. The garrison was forced to surrender and for a year the Union Jack floated over the frontier post, and southwestern Wisconsin was a part of the British empire.

At the close of the War of 1812 the fort was evacuated and shortly afterward most of the buildings were gutted by fire.

The American government then rebuilt the fort on the same site, calling it Fort Crawford. Later a new site was chosen a mile south on higher ground and a larger Fort Crawford was erected.

Zachary Taylor, later President of the United States, was commandant of it at one time. One of his lieutenants was Jefferson Davis, who led the Southern Confederacy through the Civil War. Davis fell in love with Taylor's daughter and married her, to the great displeasure of the commandant. The treaties of 1826 and 1830, wherein the Indians deeded away the last of their lands east of the Mississippi River, were signed at Fort Crawford. The Black Hawk War centered about it, and Abraham Lincoln, then a young lieutenant, was stationed at the fort during this conflict. Chief Blackhawk was taken to the post as a prisoner after his capture by the Winnebago chiefs after the route of the Sacs and Foxes at the Battle of Bad Axe.

Near the site of the fort is Fort Crawford Cemetery, where those who died during their term of service were buried. The cemetery is government owned and well cared for.

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
