Farm Conditions are Improving is Report

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Apr. 5.—Acting Director Davis of the war finance corporation in a statement Sunday noted "marked improvement in the condition of the agricultural industry and a better outlook for business generally" on the basis of April 1 reports from corporation agencies.

"Livestock producers and farmers generally," the statement said, "are reported much more confident because of improved market conditions."

"Bank deposits have increased in many agricultural communities, and the country banks are generally in a stronger position than they have been for a long time. Best of all, confidence is returning and with it the trend of business is toward a restoration of more normal conditions all along the line."

Up to March 31, the statement said, the corporation had approved loans aggregating \$322,825,097, of which \$214,187,761 was to banks, \$58,387,816 to co-operatives and \$50,250,120 for export purposes.

TRIBESMEN WOUND WOMAN

NEW YORK, Apr. 5.—Wounded by a poison-tipped spear of African tribesmen, Miss Arsula Gillis, 24, was treated at Bellevue hospital Sunday for a badly infected foot. She explained that the injury occurred at the Manhattan home of Ida Vera Simonton, African explorer, when the spear, a trophy, fell from the wall, and its point pierced her shoe and caused a deep wound in her foot.

First aid was administered by "Bombo," a negro whom Miss Simonton had brought here from Africa, who administered a native antidote.

MANY LETTERS ARE DELAYED

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Apr. 5.—From 50,000 to 100,000 letters are delayed at Chicago postoffice because the sender, writing to a firm or person presumably well known, give no street address, according to Postmaster Arthur L. Lender.

Incoming letters are sorted on the railway trains for direct delivery to sub-stations in various parts of the city. The railway mail clerks, unfamiliar with the addresses of firms or individuals, throw such letters aside. At the Chicago postoffice a special force of clerks sorts them over. The result is a delay of several hours.
