HOOVER URGES A CLEAN-UP

Would Materially Raise Standard of Building Industries in Country.

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, Apr. 6.—The practices of a small minority in the construction industry are unendurable and must be cleaned up if business and commerce desire protection, "from the steady invasion of regulatory hands of the government," said Herbert Hoover, secretary of commerce, in his address Tuesday before the fifth annual meeting of the National Federation of Construction Industries. The secretary said that during the past 10 months the department of commerce has given intensive study to the situation in the construction industry and he made the comment: "This situation must be cleaned up."

Conclusions reached by the department, Mr. Hoover summarized as follows: That the industry needs cleaning and the decent men in the industry must organize to do it; that the great indirect wastes which are beyond the control of any one individual man or concern must be eliminated by associated action and that to accomplish these ends there is needed a cleaner organization of the trades, not the destruction of the trades organization. "In the matter of business and labor practices in the minority," said Mr. Hoover, "I need not recite the repeated exposures in all directions that have sickened the public during the past 12 months. There are other things that have not yet been exposed. I have no taste for demagogic statements. I do have an aspiration for constructive remedies. Let us take a single material—lumber. Several leading manufacturers inform me that the time has

come when we must have a guarantee against short deliveries and fraudulent alteration of quantities. The product of the honest miller must reach the consumer as the manufacturer wishes his product to reach the consumer. Also, he must have protection from the crooked competitors. Many commodities are assured as to quantity and grade under the inspection and rules of our voluntary trade associations. If you think it wiser to do so we could probably secure the enactment of a pure food law in all building materials. I would much rather see the trades themselves establish their own standards.

"We need a cleaning up in the statistical work of the trade associations. Some kinds of this work stands condemned in the courts as a restraint of trade and against public interest yet other kinds of statistics are in the interest of the public as well."

MUCH FOREST ROAD BUILDING

U. S. Forest Service Plans To Build Large Mileage In This State As Part of Big Program.

PORTLAND, Apr. 6.—United States forest service this year in Oregon will build 500 miles of road, costing \$281,000; 434 miles of trail, costing \$64,000, and four bridges, costing \$26,000. In addition there will be \$26,000 for maintenance of trails and \$26,000 for maintenance of roads, according to F. H. Brundage, district forest inspector. Willamette road in the Cascade forest will be one of the projects. It will cost \$27,000 for the work from Summit to Oakridge. Between Tiller and Trail, near Lake of the Woods, \$7000 will be spent, and \$3000 for the Diamond lake road. Along the

Malheur river 15 miles of road will be built for \$7500. There will be \$15,500 spent on the Skyline road south of Clackamas lake and between Diamond lake and Crescent lake \$18,000 will be spent. The total allotment for the 14 forests in Oregon amounts to \$415,000, with \$66,000 more available from counties. The roads are primarily for fire protection in the forests and will be nine feet wide on side cuts and 12 feet wide in other places.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Apr. 6.—An appropriation of \$6,500,000 for forest roads and trails during the fiscal year 1932 will be included in a roads bill, authorized to be reported out of the house roads committee. This sum was put in as an amendment offered by Representative Summers of Washington, the only western member of the committee. Roads and trails in the national forests will be taken care of in the coming fiscal year with an appropriation made by congress last December. The house committee also authorizes an appropriation of \$65,000,000 for improved highway construction in 1932 and \$75,000,000 for 1934.
