**Spray Calendar Out—**  
The county agent's office is in receipt of a number of copies of the orchard spray recommendations for 1922. These are available for free distribution as long as they last. The calendar gives directions as to time to apply different sprays and materials to use for the different pests and diseases. It should be very useful to orchard men in controlling the pests which are responsible largely for success or failure of orchard work.

## SEVENTY-FOUR PERMITS ISSUED

State Engineer's Office Gives Permission to Two Union County Men to Use Water.

During the months of January, February and March, seventy-four permits have been issued by State Engineer, Percy A. Cupper, for the appropriation of water from streams throughout the State of Oregon. The permits cover the irrigation of 10,166 acres of land, the development of 1902 horsepower, and use of water for mining, municipal, domestic and various other purposes. The estimated cost of construction work under the permits is approximately \$212,000.00. During this period, four permits to construct reservoirs for the storage of 711 acre feet of water were issued, and the estimated cost of construction work is \$15,000.00.

Among the more important permits issued are the following:  
To the City of Milton, Union County, for the appropriation of water from Walla Walla river for development of 1770 horsepower. This development will cover the construction of a pipe line two and one-half miles in length, and a power house, but no estimate of cost was given.

To the Wallowa Valley Improvement District No. 1, for the appropriation of water from Big Sheep Creek and its tributaries for the irrigation of 8598 acres of land, and the estimated cost of construction work is \$125,000. This project is practically completed.

To Baar and Cunningham, of Portland, Oregon, for the appropriation of water from North Fork of Scappoose River for domestic and industrial purposes. The estimated cost of construction is \$20,000.00.

To the Shevlin-Hixon Company, of Bend, for the appropriation of water from Paulina Creek for log pond, domestic use, and for use in steam boilers. The estimated cost of construction is \$12,000.00.

To the Big Four Mining Company, of Applegate, Oregon, covering the appropriation of water from North Fork of Steamboat Creek for development of 25 horsepower, and for mining purposes in Josephine County. The estimated construction cost is \$5,000.

In Union County permit has been issued to G. F. Hall of Union, covering the appropriation of water from Catherine Creek for irrigation of 100 acres of land, and to J. B. Hagey of La Grande covering the appropriation of water from Taylor and Mill creeks for irrigation of a ten-acre tract.

**COPIES TO CARRY RADIOS.**  
DETROIT, Mich., Apr. 7.—The city council has approved an appropriation of \$2500 for installing radio equipment for the police department. The innovation was suggested by Police Commissioner Inches, who told the council the radio would increase the effectiveness of the department. Receiving equipment is to be set up in district stations and a sending outfit at headquarters.

**OFFICER A. W. O. L.**

SAN FRANCISCO, Apr. 7.—Army officers at the Presidio Thursday admitted that Lieut. Ralph J. Mitchell has been absent from his command at Fort Riley since January 23. He is the first officer to be marked "absent without leave" at the Presidio in its 73 years of existence as a United States army post.

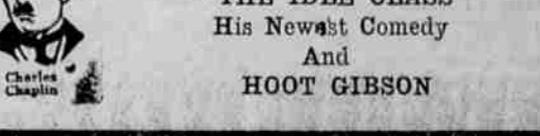
