CHILEAN COAST TARIFF.—(By Associated Press.) SANTIAGO, Chile, Apr. 7.—Coastwise shipping between Chilean ports, excepting Punta Arenas, will be reserved exclusively to Chilean vessels after January 1, 1923, under a law passed by congress after long debate. The national mercantile marine fleet becomes part of the naval reserve and may be expropriated in time of war. Supporters of the measure look upon it as a necessity to save the national shipping lines from financial ruin in face of foreign competition.

HEMP LOSING PRESTIGE.—(By Associated Press.) MANILA, P. I., Apr. 7.—The total production of Manila hemp in 1921 was 692,822 bales, compared with 1,051,661 bales in 1920, a reduction of about 30 per cent. The decrease in production is ascribed to the poor demand, especially in the United States, which is the chief consumer of hemp.

NO PAY CUTS.—ASTORIA, Apr. 7.—While no official action on the matter was taken by the Astoria board of school directors, at its meeting today, the sentiment expressed by some of the directors indicated that there will be practically no reduction in the salaries of the teachers in the Astoria district for the coming school year.

MANY PLANT TREES.—PRINEVILLE, Apr. 7.—The Crook county chamber has appointed Rev. M. B. Gallagher, J. E. Meyers, and George Nicolai a committee to consider the planting of trees and shrubbery in the streets to beautify the city.

EMPLOYMENT GAINS.—WASHINGTON, Apr. 7.—Increased employment ranging up to 28 per cent over the preceding month was reported today to the employment service of the department of labor from 43 to 65 representative cities for the month ending March 31. The automotive and allied industries, iron and steel, and their products and lumber headed the trades showing improved activity. The net increase for the country, figured on reports from 1428 firms, was 25 per cent.

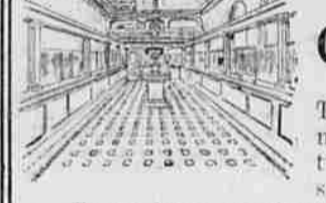
