SCIENTISTS TO MEET IN JUNE

SALT LAKE CITY, Apr. 10.—A special summer meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science will be held here jointly with the annual meeting of the Pacific Division comprises members in Alaska, British Columbia, Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho, Utah, Mexico (except Sonora and Chihuahua), Hawaii, the Philippines, and other islands of the Pacific.

In 1921 the association apportioned \$5,000 from its endowment in 24 different grants to individuals and organizations to aid in the research. The membership of the association is 12,000; that of the Pacific division about 1,500. While the purpose of the association is to aid science in the Americas, it is open to members in other parts of the world.

The association cooperates with 57 American scientific organizations, including 54 affiliated societies and academies of science, each of which has one or more representatives in the council of the association, besides 43 associated societies, which sometimes meet with the association. These organizations represent the social and economic sciences as well as mathematics and the natural sciences.

The association publishes a weekly journal, Science.

GENERAL ARRESTED.

Statue of Feud Chief Is to Be Erected Soon

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., Apr. 10.—A life-size statue of "Devil Anse" Hatfield, fur-famed feud chief, is en route to Huntington from Carrara, Italy, where it was carved by an Italian sculptor. It will be placed on a hill overlooking the cemetery on Main Island Creek, Logan county, where the remains of the mountaineer have found a last resting place in the family burying ground, and within sight of the mountains where the well known

Anse fought many of his battles with the McCoy family. The statue shows the old mountaineer chief, dressed in his native garb, standing erect and looking toward the hills. When placed upon its pedestal it will be 12 feet high. On the front of the pedestal will be carved the names of Anse and his wife, and on the rear the names of their thirteen children.

Elms Replanted Near Tomb of U. S. Grant

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Apr. 10.—Two American elm trees have been taken from the old Grant farm in St. Louis county for shipment to New York to be replanted near President Grant's tomb on Riverside Drive on the one hundredth anniversary of his birth, April 27. The American Forestry association at Washington requested the trees from August Busch, present owner of the farm. The trees are about three and one half inches in diameter and 15 to 20 feet high. Ulysses S. Grant resided on the farm from 1853 to 1860 in a log cabin which still stands.
