POPE DISLIKED SHORT SKIRTS

PARIS, Apr. 10.—The late Pope Benedict XV was a militant feminist and many times expressed the opinion that women had a great mission in the world and for Christianity in particular, but he was as outspoken in his criticism as he was in his praise when some trait in woman did not meet with his approval.

He thoroughly disliked short skirts. According to a story which has just come from Rome, the Pope noticed one day crossing the court of St. Damaso, a woman who had called at the Vatican on some business with the Secretariat. She was wearing the latest Paris style of skirt which barely covered her knees.

Turning to the Bishop near him, the Pope said, "I really cannot sit

derstand some women. They have no respect for anyone, not even the Pope. In the days of my youth I recall that all the young girls, my sisters for instance, were putting their mothers to put them in long skirts. Now it appears that all the old women wish to wear short ones."

DRASTIC CUTS IN LEGATIONS

BUCHAREST, Apr. 10.—Like every other European government the Rumanian government finds it very difficult to make both ends meet and the order has gone forth that the pruning knife of economy is to be mercilessly applied wherever possible.

Drastic cuts are to take place in all branches of the diplomatic service. The Rumanian legations in Christiania, Helsinki, Tokyo and Cairo are to be discontinued. The legation in London is to consist henceforth of a minister and one secretary only.

The staffs of the Rumanian delegations on the league of nations and the reparations commission in Paris, Vienna and Budapest are to be cut down also.

BALFOUR MAY ADD TO COAT

LONDON, Apr. 10.—Now that Arthur James Balfour, who was head of the British delegation to the Washington conference on the limitation of armaments, has been made Sir Arthur Balfour and a Knight of the Garter, he becomes entitled to the addition of "supporters" to his coat of arms. These "supporters" generally take the form of some heraldic animals supporting the shield on each side and may only be used by the royal family and the most exalted orders of knighthood.

In the case of peers, they go with the peerage but for knights they are only for life. They are always granted specifically and apart from the arms.

Sir Arthur's arms, which showed three black stars and a seal's head with a crest of a palm tree, will henceforth be encircled by a blue bekked belt edged with gold, representing the Garter. The surmounting helmet, which for plain "esquires" is in profile, now became full-faced, with the visor raised.

The motto which goes with his arm is "Virtus ad aethera tendit."
