SEVEN FLUNK OUT.
EUGENE, Apr. 11.—Six men and one woman were dropped from the rolls of the university as the result of last year's work. The number put on probation for the spring term has been placed at 39, of which number 31 are men. Students failing to make nine hours of credits in a term are placed on probation for the following term, according to university regulations. Failure to make three hours in any term means that the student is dropped from the rolls. A student placed on probation for a term must make enough hours in the following term to make a total of 17 hours for the two terms.

The number placed on probation this term is just one fourth that of the fall term. Carlton E. Spencer, the registrar, believes this improvement is due to the fact that the students are studying more and putting a great deal more effort in their work.

Death of Hiram P. Williams Occurred Here This Morning

Hiram P. Williams passed away this morning at 9:05 o'clock at his home. He was 66 years 5 months and 11 days of age at the time of his death. The funeral will be held from the Snodgrass and Zimmerman Chapel tomorrow afternoon at two o'clock. Hiram P. Williams was born in Peachbottom, Pennsylvania, and was married to Mary Catherine Morton in 1875 at Monroe, Wisconsin. He moved to Colorado in 1888 and thence on to Oregon in 1912. His survivors are his widow, Mary Catherine Williams, 1505 Monroe street; two daughters, Mrs. Frank George of La Grande, and Mrs. O. L. McCartney of Glenwood Springs, Colorado; three sons, Guy C. Williams of Clark, Nevada; James L. Williams of Holbrook, Arizona, and Dr. C. LaVern Williams of Glenwood Springs, Colorado.

Petty Larceny Verdict In Auto Theft Case

The case of the State of Oregon vs. T. J. Keelen, in which the latter was charged with larceny of an automobile in connection with another party, was concluded last evening and turned over to the jury at 6:30 o'clock. The jury returned this morning at 9:30 o'clock with a verdict of guilty of petty larceny. The sentence will be imposed April 21. The trial began Thursday, April 6, a special venire of 18 jurors being drawn to complete the jury. The case has aroused much interest as Keelen was tried once before and found guilty, but appealed his case to the supreme court. Ed Wright, prosecuting attorney, and E. R. Ringo represented the state, and John Heflin and R. J. Green represented the defendant. Judge Gustav Anderson, of Baker, tried the case.

Noted Lecturer To Be Here Three Days During Next Week

President of Spokane University to Give Series of Interesting Talks On Science. A. MacKendie Meldrum, president of Spokane University, credited to be one of the leading scholars in the northwest, and noted as an educator and scientist, will give a series of lectures here next week. He has resided in 40 countries of the world and has taken part in oceanic exploration expeditions and in choosing the subjects for his lectures, which are to be given at 8 o'clock April 17, 18 and 19 in the Christian church, he will select those which have a direct bearing on the work he has done as a scientist. On Monday evening he will lecture on "Adventures While Exploring the South Seas," on Tuesday on "Anthropology, Or a Study of the Lowest Human Beings in the World," and on Wednesday on "The World's Scenic Masterpieces."
