SAYS DRY LAW RENUMERATIVE

PHILADELPHIA, Apr. 12.—Revenues from the national prohibition act should pay many times over for the ten million dollars appropriated for the enforcement of the dry laws during the coming year, Prohibition Commissioner Haynes declared in an address Monday night before a law enforcement meeting.

"It would be interesting to the people to know," he said, "that if we were to collect fines, penalties and special tax imposed upon violators of the law in the first six months of this administration, they would more than pay two and one-half times the estimated cost of enforcing the prohibition law for the next year. These enormous figures do not include nearly three million dollars in bonds that are being forfeited to the government, or two million dollars that have been offered in compromise by 2 of the large violators of the law, and do not include the six million dollars in differential or prohibitive taxes that have been referred to previously."

Mr. Haynes declared that after 10 months of renewed effort to restrict good liquor to legitimate channels, the result "is perhaps as nearly achievement as possible."

Asserting that there was a propaganda to create the impression that the prohibition law was un-operative, Mr. Haynes said: "It is significant that at the time when liquor is the most difficult to obtain in all our history, when drunkenness has decreased to a very appreciable degree; when convictions for violations of the law are becoming most numerous; that at such time the largest amount of space is given in some of our numerous papers to articles most flimsy of fact which set forth the idea that prohibition is a failure."

AIRPLANE WRECKED. ERESCO, Calif., Apr. 12.—Aaron Clements, clerk for the San Joaquin Light & Power company, was killed instantly this afternoon when an airplane at the Aerial circus, in which he was a passenger, crashed from a height of 200 feet. Ed Bishop, a Fresno pilot, was seriously hurt. Nearly 25,000 persons saw the smashup.
