

JOSEPH BOY DIES IN SOUTH

 JOSEPH, Apr. 12.—Died, in Phoenix, Arizona, Tuesday, April 4, John H. Murray, eight son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Murray, of Joseph, Oregon. John Murray was a junior in the Joseph high school when in January, 1920, he was stricken with the flu. It was found months later that his lungs were affected and he went to a sanitarium at Milwaukee, Oregon. After several months' treatment he returned to Joseph much improved in health, but when winter came he became worse and went to Phoenix, Arizona. He grew better and then worse and after an operation for flatula in August, 1921, never regained his strength.

In March he was somewhat improved and wrote of coming home but had a backset and failed rapidly. The day before his death his parents read a message telling of his condition and the father started for Arizona to reach there four days after his son had passed away. John was a fine young man, home loving, studious and a popular boy in school. He was born in Godman, Ark., May 9, 1902.


