WOOD TICKS NUMEROUS

HILGARD, Apr. 12.—The recent rains have made the road to Hilgard and up the river next to impassable with any kind of a conveyance. Horseback is the popular method of travel and that only when necessity demands. The snow has entirely disappeared except for drifts on the north slopes and the new grass has at last been able to make a feeble start. A few head of stock have already been turned out on the short grazing.

Though the season has been late enough in most things the wood tick has put in an unusually early appearance and the present outlook promises a bumper crop of these lively pests. The ant has nothing on Mr. Tick for industry and not a few bear witness that he is onto his job.

J. W. Scott is having several miles of fence built, in some places replacing old and in others building entirely on new lines. Though the weather has been generally stormy, work is progressing nicely.

John Dixon and Wm. Dixon are also working at fence building, having taken a contract to fence certain sections of the state highway above Hilgard. As yet they are only working on making posts until weather conditions improve.

Work has again begun on the big bridge below Hilgard known as the "Clarkson" bridge. A small trestle is at work and a larger number of men will be added soon. This bridge is not far from completion as it is estimated that four or five weeks at the most will see it finished.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Sanford have spent the past week rearranging their home and are now prepared to take care of both boarders and roomers.

Five men, the advance guard of Porter and Conley, contractors, arrived in Hilgard Friday. They are awaiting the arrival of a twenty-five ton rock-crusher to be shipped to this station for unloading and removal on to the highway when the road graveling will begin. A larger crew will be taken on later as occasion demands.

Dan Cable has disposed of his re-

maining stock and closed up his business in Hilgard and expects to remove with his family to some other locality in the near future.
