Experts on Russia, and both are becoming increasingly dissatisfied the further they delve into it.
Adolph Joffe of the Russian delegation declared Thursday that many of the recommendations in the report were "quite absurd" and designed to put Russia under a foreign yoke "the same as Turkey and China."
Two currents of opinion seem to have arisen in the Russian delegation here. One is absolutely intransigent in favoring the proposals contained in the report of the allied experts. The other favors acceptance of the report as a basis for discussion.

PIERCE TALKS TO ELGINITES

ELGIN, Apr. 14.—ELGIN had its introduction to state politics on Saturday, when ex-senator Walter M. Pierce, who is the candidate for governor, for the democratic party, gave a speech outlining his position on the tax situation of the state. The occasion was the meeting of the county farmers union. Very few people knew that Mr. Pierce was to make an address so the number of people in attendance was small, but the tax question is of extreme interest to every farmer and the discussion that followed Mr. Pierce's address proved that people are thinking seriously of the problem.
